- 5. The committee shall cease to exist on the 2 May 2007.

The Commission will be serviced from existing Assembly Parliamentary Service staff resources at no additional cost.

Benefits of the Commission

Establishing the shadow Commission, which will comprise cross party representation, would be the best way forward to consider the matters within the responsibility of the future Assembly Commission as set out in Clause 27 of the Government of Wales Bill.


