This month will see a week-long campaign take place in the urban renewal areas of Sandfields East and Aberavon.

It coincides with national Dog Fouling Week and aims to keep the streets of the two wards free of potentially harmful muck.

Renewal area team members will team up with Keep Wales Tidy to patrol the streets and raise awareness of the need for responsible dog ownership.

The campaign, held from May 15 to 19, will see leaflets and advice dished out to residents, explaining the rules and encouraging people not to break them.

Also taking part will be police community support officers and local volunteers.

Keep Wales Tidy and Neath Port Talbot waste enforcement officers will visit primary schools to talk to pupils about the problems created by fouling.

They will be given dog fouling bags and encouraged to pass them on to any dog owners they know, and will be entered into a prize draw at the same time.

Cabinet member for social services and housing, Arwyn Woolcock, said: "Allowing your dog to foul in the streets is an issue that upsets residents and which the council will not tolerate.

It is important that those residents who do this and do not pick up the mess realise that it is offensive and dangerous."
