Datganiad Personol gan David Melding

Personal Statement by David Melding

David Melding: I take this opportunity to explain why I have resigned as Chair of the Committee on Standards of Conduct. The Committee's workload has been extensive and more exacting than was perhaps originally anticipated. Many of the Assembly's procedures and Standing Orders have needed refinement and adaptation during its inaugural term. The Committee has been keen to use the light of experience to examine the efficacy of a standards regime that was designed in the run-up to the Assembly's creation in 1999. Essentially, our task has been to make a given system more coherent, not to replace it with a whole new structure of our own. In its annual debates on the Committee's work, the Assembly in Plenary has never indicated any anxiety about this approach.

However, of all the issues examined, none has caused more difficulty than the unique requirement for membership of the Freemasons to be registered by Assembly Members. After nearly two years' work, the Committee on Standards of Conduct unanimously proposed a change to the rules. However, our recommendation to replace the present unique obligation on freemasons with a common requirement for AMs to record membership of all private clubs and societies was defeated in Plenary last Wednesday. Had it been carried by the necessary two-thirds majority, the change would have preserved the existing requirement to register freemasonry and satisfied freemasons that they were not being singled out unfairly. In acting as it has, the Assembly has, at least temporarily, destroyed the Committee's authority. The Committee must review sensitive matters, as well as complaints against Members. That work is impossible unless Committee members act in a non-partisan way. The judgment of the Committee on Standards of Conduct on substantive issues should be confirmed by Plenary when the Committee has achieved consensus. Otherwise, there is no hope of the Assembly having an effective standards

David Melding: Achubaf ar y cyfle hwn i egluro pam yr wyf wedi ymddiswyddo o fod yn Gadeirydd y Pwyllgor Safonau Ymddygiad. Bu llwyth gwaith y Pwyllgor yn helaeth ac yn fanylach nag a ragwelwyd yn wreiddiol o bosibl. Bu'n rhaid gwella ac chaboli llawer o weithdrefnau a Rheolau Sefydlog y Cynulliad yn ystod ei dymor cyntaf. Bu'r Pwyllgor yn awyddus i ddefnyddio goleuni profiad i archwilio effeithiolydd cyfundrefn safonau a ddyfeisiwyd yn y cyfnod cyn sefydlu'r Cynulliad yn 1999. Yn y bôn, ein tasg oedd gwneud system benodol yn fwy cyson, nid creu fframwaith cyfan newydd i'w roi yn ei lle. Yn ei ddadleuon blynnyddol ar waith y Pwyllgor, nid yw Cyfarfod Llawn y Cynulliad erioed wedi nodi unrhyw bryder ynghylch y dull gweithredu hwn.

Fodd bynnag, o'r holl faterion a archwiliwyd, nid oes yr un wedi peri mwy o anhawster na'r gofyniad unigryw i Aelodau'r Cynulliad gofrestru aelodaeth o'r Seiri Rhyddion. Wedi ymron ddwy flynedd o waith, cynigiodd y Pwyllgor Safonau Ymddygiad yn unfrydol i newid y rheolau. Fodd bynnag, yn y Cyfarfod Llawn ddydd Mercher diwethaf, trechwyd ein hargymhelliaid y dylid cyfnewid y rhwymedigaeth unigryw bresennol ar seiri rhyddion â gofyniad cyffredinol i Aelodau'r Cynulliad gofnodi eu haeldodaeth o bob clwb a chymdeithas breifat. Pe bai'r cynnig wedi'i dderbyn gan y mwyafrif gofynnol o ddwy ran o dair, byddai'r newid wedi cadw'r gofyniad presennol i gofrestru aelodaeth o'r Seiri Rhyddion ac wedi bodloni seiri rhyddion na wahaniaethir yn annheg yn eu herbys. Drwy weithredu fel y gwnaeth, mae'r Cynulliad wedi dinistrio awdurdod y Pwyllgor, dros dro o leiaf. Rhaid i'r Pwyllgor adolygu materion sensitif, yn ogystal â chwynion yn erbyn Aelodau. Mae'r gwaith hwnnw'n amhosibl oni bai bod aelodau'r Pwyllgor yn gweithredu'n amhleidiol. Dylai barn y Pwyllgor Safonau Ymddygiad ar faterion o bwys gael ei chadarnhau gan y Cyfarfod Llawn pan fo'r Pwyllgor wedi dod i gonsensws. Fel arall, nid oes gobaith cael

regime based on internal regulation within the bounds set by law. If this seems self-evident, I remind Members that the precedent set last week is that a unanimous recommendation from the Committee can be overturned by Plenary, even in the face of persuasive legal advice. I believe that, by resigning as Chair, I can offer the Committee some protection from what I consider to be arbitrary pressures. The Assembly must not allow the current debilitating situation to persist. It should move quickly to set a new and honourable precedent to never overturn a clear decision by the Committee on Standards of Conduct, other than for strictly legal considerations. Without such a convention, the Committee will be permanently enfeebled.

We are privileged to serve in the Assembly's inaugural term. It is only to be expected that, in its early days, the Assembly will occasionally stumble. However, the Plenary's decision on freemasonry was a serious error of judgment that, if not corrected, will cause lasting damage to this institution.

The Presiding Officer: I am grateful to you, David, for the tone of your personal statement and for your service to the Assembly thus far.

Cwestiynau i'r Prif Weinidog Questions to the First Minister

Targedau Iechyd Health Targets

Q1 Alun Cairns: Would the First Minister make a statement on progress towards meeting health targets? (OAQ20301)

The First Minister (Rhodri Morgan): The Chief Medical Officer for Wales's report for the year 2001-02 charts progress in meeting the 15 health-gain targets set out in 'Better Health, Better Wales'. The report shows positive trends in lung, breast and cervical cancers and in coronary heart disease and strokes. There is less, but nevertheless positive, evidence of improvement in relation

Heb gonfensiwn o'r fath, bydd y Pwyllgor wedi'i wanhanu'n barhaol.

Mae'n faint i ni wasanaethu yn nhymor cyntaf y Cynulliad. Mae'n gwbl ddisgwyliadwy y bydd y Cynulliad yn baglu weithiau yn ei ddyddiau cynnar. Fodd bynnag, yr oedd penderfyniad y Cyfarfod Llawn ar y Seiri Rhyddion yn gamfarn ddifrifol a fydd yn peri niwed parhaol i'r sefydliad hwn os na chaiff ei chywiro.

Y Llywydd: Yr wyf yn ddiolchgar ichi, David, am naws eich datganiad personol ac am eich gwasanaeth i'r Cynulliad hyd yn hyn.

C1 Alun Cairns: A wnaiff y Gweinidog ddatganiad ar y camau a gymerwyd i gyrraedd targedau iechyd? (OAQ20301)

Y Prif Weinidog (Rhodri Morgan): Mae adroddiad Prif Swyddog Meddygol Cymru am y flwyddyn 2001-02 yn disgrifiwr cynnydd o ran cyrraedd y 15 targed cynnydd mewn iechyd a nodwyd yn 'Gwell Iechyd, Gwell Cymru'. Mae'r adroddiad yn dangos tueddiadau cadarnhaol yng nghanser yr ysgyfaint, y fron a cheg y groth ac yng nghlefyd coronaidd y galon a strôc. Mae llai

to teenage smoking and dental caries, but for other matters, such as accidents and low birth-weight, the report does not find evidence of improvement. However, it demonstrates the Government's determination to provide services in Wales that focus on the health of our population and not simply on the creation of an illness service.

Alun Cairns: As we approach the end of the Assembly term, with elections in around six months' time, it is worth reminding the First Minister of the commitments made in the last election. The Labour Party's manifesto stated:

'By the end of a Labour Assembly's first term, no one will wait more than six months for outpatient treatment, or more than 18 months for inpatient treatment'.

The latest statistics show that the number of people waiting more than six months for outpatient treatment rose from 5,956 in March 1997 to 83,433 by 30 September 2002. The number of people waiting longer than 18 months for in-patient operations rose from 1,402 in March 1997 to 4,335 by 30 September. First Minister, do you think that it is time that you apologised?

The First Minister: Waiting lists are important. However, I answered the question as it was set down. You chose to table the question as you did and I answered it honestly, responding to how you framed the question. While waiting lists are important, most people's experience of the national health service relates to seeing a consultant about chronic conditions such as arthritis, bronchitis, diabetes and coronary heart disease, and does not relate to waiting lists. If you concentrate on waiting lists alone, you miss out the majority of the NHS's work in dealing with those chronic conditions. That is what takes up a large part of its time. I am astonished that you are unable to pick up on the answer to your question. I answered your question. If you did not want to ask that question, why did you table it? I can only answer the questions as tabled. The Chief Medical Officer for Wales's report shows that there was an improvement and positive

Kirsty Williams: Do you agree that the way that targets have been set in the past has sometimes had the negative effect of distorting clinical priorities? Do you agree that we must move towards a more holistic way of measuring healthcare performance and patients' experience of the service?

The First Minister: I agree. I thought that that was what Alun Cairns was trying to get at in framing his question as he did. He asked about health targets and my response was about health targets. It was a good question, but he now realises that he did not want to ask it in the first place because he is not interested in health gains. The public is interested in health gains. According to the Chief Medical Officer, there are clear health gains as regards lung cancer, breast cancer, cervical cancer, coronary heart disease and strokes. That is undoubtedly a measure of the achievements made in improving the population's health and lifestyles and of the achievements made by the consultants, the GPs, the nurses and all those who work for the NHS.

The Leader of the Opposition (Ieuan Wyn Jones): The First Minister must get down from his academic high horse and answer the question. When he fought the election in 1999, he promised the people of Wales that nobody would wait more than six months for their first out-patient treatment, yet now there are 83,433 people waiting. He made a target and has missed it by a mile. Rather helpfully, the Labour Party's next manifesto has been leaked to the press. It quite candidly and openly states that cutting waiting lists has proved to be a far greater challenge than anyone anticipated. Let me repeat the question: will the First Minister now apologise for making a pledge that he has not kept, or will he tell us that he will honour it in the next six months?

The First Minister: No draft manifesto of

the Labour Party has been leaked to the press. Ieuan says that I have not answered the question. Unfortunately for you, Ieuan, I answered the question that Alun Cairns asked. You may not like the answer and Alun Cairns may not like the answer, but it was the right question to answer. The public is interested in whether the health gain targets have been achieved. That progress has been made is not my view; it is the view of the Chief Medical Officer for Wales. I am sure that Ieuan will not question her integrity even though he may wish to question mine. The Chief Medical Officer says that there are positive trends in relation to lung cancer, breast cancer, cervical cancer, coronary heart disease and strokes and that, in other regards, improvements are not quite so positive. These targets are key to improving the health of the population of Wales, and that is what the population wants.

Ieuan Wyn Jones: I am astonished that the First Minister should find it so difficult to say ‘I made a promise, I got it wrong and I apologise’. That is all that we ask the First Minister to do. If the First Minister thinks that waiting lists are a sensitive issue, as he clearly does—because he has got on his high horse today—why does he not acknowledge that his Minister for Health and Social Services should spend the next six months tackling waiting lists, rather than spending time on a costly, unnecessary, bureaucratic reform that will not reduce the waiting lists one iota?

The First Minister: All I do is to look at the questions and answer them. The question that I answered may not have been the one that Ieuan wishes that Alun Cairns had asked, and Alun Cairns may wish that he had asked a different question. However, he did not table a question about waiting lists, but about health gain targets, and I gave an answer on health gain targets. Ieuan may not like it that there has been an improvement in health gains. Alun clearly does not, but that is his fault for asking a question about health gain targets. If Alun cannot ask the right question, then he will not get the answer that is politically convenient for him. He needs to do

his research better. [Laughter.] Some opposition Members obviously think that improvements in terms of lung, breast and cervical cancers are a laughing matter. The people of Wales do not think that such improvements are a laughing matter. They would consider it a matter for applause that changes in lifestyles, combined with better treatment from the national health service, have brought this about.

Karen Sinclair: When I was in hospital last April, the 79-year-old lady in the bed next to me was going to have bladder surgery, and a 94-year-old lady, whom I met in the tea room and with whom I entered into conservation, had had a pacemaker fitted. First Minister, do you agree that, under the Tories, these people would not have even been considered for surgery? I can say that with total confidence because my father-in-law was in that position. He was over 65 and his case for treatment was dismissed because of his age. Do you agree that far more people are being treated by our health service now than were even considered for placement on waiting lists under the Tories? That is the reality.

The First Minister: That is true. Most of us have family members who could confirm that. Furthermore, it is notable that the Tories, when they were running the health service, suppressed the Black report, which was a study carried out in 1980 on the connection between social inequality and poor health. They did not allow its publication. We have allowed the publication of a similar report, although it is, in a sense, a rod for our own backs in that it shows how far we have to go to create the equality in health gains and in the health service that will eventually mean equality of health. The health of people at the top of the social scale and those at the bottom is not equal. As a society, we must put that right.

The Leader of the Welsh Conservatives (Nick Bourne): Let us try again, First

Minister, to get you to answer these questions, as you seem to think that you only have to answer the question that has been tabled. You have been asked several times to apologise for the waiting list situation. You seemed happy to answer a soft-ball question from Karen Sinclair, but you have not answered the basic question: will you now apologise for the fact that 83,000 people are waiting, when you said that waiting lists would be cut? You have been in power for five years. Is it not time that you took responsibility for the disaster in your running of the health service? That is the question. Let us see whether you can answer it.

The First Minister: How does a ‘disaster in your running of the health service’ equate with what Dr Ruth Hall, the Chief Medical Officer for Wales has said about substantial health gains in key areas? There have been reductions in the incidence of lung, breast and cervical cancers, coronary heart disease and strokes, and lesser improvements with regard to teenage smoking and dental caries. Those are improvements. That does not fit with the myth that Nick wishes to create by repeatedly stating that the health service is a disaster. It is not a disaster. Waiting lists are important and are far too long but the bulk of the health service’s work is carried out by consultants who deal with chronic conditions, not the episodic conditions that mostly generate waiting lists. Most people’s experience of the health service involves repeat visits to general practitioners or consultants, or sometimes treatment from paramedics, to sort out chronic conditions such as diabetes, strokes, heart disease, asthma and bronchitis. Although the length of the waiting lists is regrettable, there has been huge improvement with regard to such conditions in the national health service, treatment of which forms most people’s experience of the NHS.

Nick Bourne: Although you have not apologised, you have at least said that the waiting list is too long. How can anyone believe anything that the Labour Party states in terms of pledges or guarantees when you

She has charted progress clearly against the 15 health targets set out in 'Better Health, Better Wales'. I will not repeat them, but it shows an improving picture for health in Wales.

C3 Christine Chapman: A wnaiff y Prif

statement about improving public transport services in Wales? (OAQ20313)

The First Minister: The Assembly Government's objectives for improving public transport involve tackling social disadvantage, promoting equality of opportunity, supporting sustainable development and improving access to employment. The keys to meeting the public transport aspirations of Wales include our notable successes, for example, implementation of free travel for pensioners and the disabled and, more recently, detached consideration by the Strategic Rail Authority of a 15-year Wales and borders rail franchise, with a dedicated Valleys line business unit, from wider UK franchise considerations.

Christine Chapman: I welcome those initiatives. Do you agree that improving rail links between Cardiff and the Cynon Valley will open up the amenities and the economic benefits of the capital to my constituency? Do you also agree that a reliable bus service provides essential access to vital community facilities and that the poor service currently facing bus users in my constituency, who must suffer missed appointments, long periods standing outside in harsh weather conditions and regular expected disruption, is unacceptable?

The First Minister: I am sorry to hear about the problems with the bus service from the Cynon Valley to Pontypridd and Cardiff.

On the train service, we hope that the rail passenger partnership bid by Wales and Borders Trains to the Strategic Rail Authority will be successful. That would permit a service to operate every half-hour from the Cynon Valley from September 2003. Some investments have already been made to enable passing loops to be introduced at Mountain Ash.

On the bus services, I would prefer not to

Pauline Jarman: Since the Conservative Party deregulated the bus industry, bus operators all too frequently attempt to blame councils for their own commercial and managerial incompetence. In view of the fact that more people travel by bus in Wales than other forms of public transport, will the First Minister, with the Secretary of State for Wales, consider promoting legislation that would enable the bus industry to be nationalised?

The First Minister: I have not heard Plaid Cymru promote that suggestion before. However, we will consider the best way to promote effective bus transport; you rightly say that probably ten times as many people travel by bus daily compared with those who travel by train. That is one reason why we have initially concentrated on giving free bus passes to pensioners and people with disabilities; there is currently no equivalent for train journeys. I do not know whether action as radical as you suggest needs to be taken. Perhaps you are referring to some of the points that Christine raised regarding the Cynon Valley, although I did not rise to the bait in answering her questions. However, I do not know whether a nuclear option such as that should be adopted at this stage. I will consider the matter with Sue Essex.

Brian Gibbons: I agree with Pauline's remedy for the situation; in my constituency, we also see the need to consider the regulatory framework that governs the deregulated bus service. It is ridiculous that commercial decisions are taken that often seem perverse and cause inconvenience rather than convenience for the travelling public. Do you agree that some form of regulation is desperately needed in order to rationalise the system?

The First Minister: The bus industry is not fully deregulated. Traffic commissioners determine the suitability of operators but do not determine the route structure of services,

We have come into the debate late in the day—the bus industry was deregulated around 20 years ago. However, our actions—such as introducing free bus passes and increasing employment, which means that more people commute to work—has led to a 10 per cent increase in the number of people who use buses. Reregulating the industry would only be possible through primary legislation. We are not the regulators: the traffic commissioners are servants of the Department for Transport and not the Assembly. Although it is mainly our responsibility to deal with public transport, excluding the rail industry, we do not control the regulation of bus operators. That is still a matter for the traffic commissioners and the Department for Transport.

Peter Black: Do you agree that the Conservative Party’s misleading characterisation of an essential business presence as an expensive and unnecessary embassy demonstrates the party’s irrelevance and how out of touch it is with the need to improve the Welsh export market, attract new jobs to Wales and promote Wales abroad?

The First Minister: The Conservatives are not interested in exports or inward investment, and they do not want to see business develop. They are in a corner all on their own; I feel sorry for the Tories in Wales today.

The Tories are not interested in Wales's profile or in its economic growth.

The First Minister: I meet the Secretary of State on a regular basis to discuss matters of a common interest. These include the development of a strong evidence base to inform strategic decision-making. Information from the Office for National Statistics is a major component of building that evidence base. You will be aware, as a result of last Wednesday's announcement about the labour force survey figures, that, between September 2001 and September 2002, the total number of jobs in the Welsh economy increased by 33,000. This information is one of the fruits of our investment in increasing the labour force survey's sample size from 4,700 to 21,000. We made that investment in order to get more accurate and dependable figures. The first fruits of that investment are beginning to come through. I am sure that you welcome the statistics and the increase of 33,000 jobs.

The First Minister: I am not sure what happens between censuses. However, there must be a revision as some areas, such as Ceredigion, were upgraded and others, such as Cardiff, were downgraded following the 2001 census, and as it has been suggested that even the 1991 census is no longer a reliable record of how many people lived in Wales at that time, and where they lived. Fortunately for the Assembly, the readjustment downwards of the English population was, proportionately, greater than that of the Welsh population as a whole. We do not lose money as a result, but there will be a review of which areas receive what proportion of rate support grant where that is based upon population changes, as it appears that the figures have been wrong for the past 20 years.

Q6 Helen Mary Jones: What discussions has the First Minister had with the Minister for Health and Social Services regarding funding health services in west Wales? (OAQ20294)

The First Minister: The final budget for the year starting on 1 April 2003 was agreed on 6 November. Draft allocations will be issued to the service before Christmas for technical verification, with final allocations due to be agreed shortly afterwards, in the early months of the new year.

Helen Mary Jones: There is grave concern in my constituency about the impact that Carmarthenshire NHS Trust's financial position may have on the provision of essential services such as maternity services and accident and emergency cover. Will you give a commitment that your Government will not agree with the trust any recovery plan that would lead to cuts in these and other essential front-line services?

The First Minister: I cannot make such guarantees in the Chamber today if there are financial problems. If such problems exist—I do not know whether they do—they must be addressed. That could be done by way of the Wanless review, which will start soon. Large areas of health authority debts have been written off—debts amounting to about £30 million, I think—but as some of the accumulated financial deficits will be passed on to local health boards, this must be sorted out as quickly as possible.

Glyn Davies: Will you consider establishing designated foundation hospitals as a way of improving health services in west Wales and reducing the number of people waiting for treatment—which currently stands at 83,000—or have you ruled out the use of such hospitals in Wales?

The First Minister: You have mixed up two concepts. It is by way of the proposed elective surgery units—which will be privately financed in England—that we could directly tackle waiting lists. We have never ruled out using elective surgery units, although they would not be part of the private sector in Wales. Foundation hospitals are less relevant in terms of reducing waiting lists. We have no proposals to establish foundation hospitals in Wales, whatever their merits in

Cyffur Gwrthiselder, Seroxat Anti-depressant Drug, Seroxat

Q7 Alison Halford: What discussions has the First Minister had with the UK Government regarding the safe use, or otherwise, of the anti-depressant drug, Seroxat? (OAQ20314)

The First Minister: The safety of prescribed drugs is not a devolved matter. It remains an issue for the UK Government, and is dealt with by the Medicines Control Agency and the Committee on Safety of Medicines. I believe that there have been recent studies of Seroxat, which has been used successfully to treat depressive illness in millions of people worldwide. The British National Formulary, which is supplied to all doctors in Wales, has recently been amended to take account of reports of patients experiencing difficulties when trying to come off Seroxat.

Alison Halford: One of my constituents is taking that particular drug. I understand that there is growing evidence in a small percentage of cases that Seroxat can induce self-harm or violent behaviour. My constituent drove a vehicle through the doors of a medical help centre when trying to get medical assistance. He was imprisoned for four years. His parents are happy that he remains in prison because he is receiving some kind of support. However, in light of that, will the Minister for Health and Social Services looks at this drug rather than leave the issue to other authorities?

The First Minister: If it is unsuitable for some patients because of behavioural consequences when the drug is withdrawn or when patients try to reduce their dependency on it, that unsuitability will be the same in Wales as in England. It is wise that we have a British National Formulary. The recent amendment is currently being supplied to all doctors to warn them of what can happen when patients try to come off the drug. The

consequences are alarming, and I presume that your constituent was trying to come off the drug rather than experiencing side effects of taking it. I am unaware of the treatment's side effects but it creates a dependency and causes severe withdrawal symptoms when patients want to come off it. However, if you want to write to me about that, I will ensure that your letter is passed on to the Medicines Control Agency to consider further amendments to the British National Formulary.

Y Prif Weinidog: Yr oedd naw o bobl ifanc o Gymru yn bresennol yn uwchgynhadledd y ddaear ar ddatblygu cynaliadwy yn Johannesburg ym mis Awst. Etholwyd tri ohonynt gan eu cyfoedion mewn cynhadledd fis Gorffennaf diwethaf, a drefnwyd, yn anuniongyrchol drwy ein hadnoddau ni, gan y Ganolfan Dechnoleg Amgen. Yr oedd hynny yn gymorth iddynt deithio i Johannesburg ac aros yno gyda'u gwarchodwyr.

David Lloyd: What will the First Minister do about the strong-arm tactics used to market new drugs, which can play down their side effects?

The First Minister: If these drugs are being marketed inappropriately, we would need conclusive evidence before any accusations could be made. We have heard of some of these large companies giving holidays as prizes for introducing new medications and so on, but establishing what is acceptable or unacceptable in terms of selling new medications is too difficult for doctors. However, if you have evidence that inappropriate marketing is happening in Wales, I would be grateful to receive that evidence, and I will inform the Department of Health of those examples.

Q8 Delyth Evans: What support did the Assembly provide to enable young people from Wales to attend the earth summit in Johannesburg? (OAQ20309)

The First Minister: Nine young people from Wales were present at the earth summit on sustainable development in Johannesburg in August. Three of those were elected by their peers in a conference last July, which was organised, indirectly using our resources, by the Centre for Alternative Technology. That assisted them to travel to Johannesburg and stay there with their chaperones.

David Davies: First Minister, you can find the means to support young people who want to attend the environment conference in Johannesburg but, as reported in *The Western Mail* the other day, you cannot find the means to support young people who need to have their tonsils removed. Are your priorities not a little strange?

The Presiding Officer: Order. This question does not relate to the health service.

Janet Davies: Reducing, reusing and recycling resources is immensely important to the young people who went to Johannesburg, First Minister. Therefore, are you ready to implement the relevant new European Union directive that will soon take effect?

The First Minister: When we consider how to action the recommendations that arise from Johannesburg, we will do so in line with our

Delyth Evans: Recently, the Mid Wales Regional Committee heard evidence from these young people about their trip to Johannesburg. They returned with exceptionally good ideas about the way forward. Do you agree that this is a good example of the way that the Assembly supports young people, and will you consider meeting with this group again to see how you can help develop some of their ideas?

The First Minister: A summit will be held in Swansea before Christmas. Those nine young people, between the ages of 18 and 23, who represented the youth of Wales in the summit, will be present, as far as I know, next month. They were excellent ambassadors, and I was proud of the way that they conducted themselves. No group was as prominent during the summit and its meetings, including the summit's fringe meetings. I am waiting to hear from the next generation in the conference in Swansea next month what sort of lead they can give, and what sort of lead they expect from Wales's adults, including the Assembly and its Government.

Y Prif Weinidog: Mae amcanion y Cynulliad ar gyfer gwella cludiant cyhoeddus yn cynnwys mynd i'r afael ag anfantis gymdeithasol, hyrwyddo cyfle cyfartal, a chefnogi datblygu cynaliadwy drwy gyfrwng cludiant cyhoeddus sydd wedi ei gydlynun well ac yn fwy integredig. Mae'r rhain yn hanfodol i gyflawni dyheadau pobl gogledd Cymru, ac mae ein llwyddiannau hyd yn hyn yn cynnwys cyflwyno teithio am ddim i bensiynwyr a phobl anabl ac, o ganlyniad i arian gan y Cynulliad, wella'r gwasanaethau trenau rhwng y Gogledd a'r De, gan gynnig mwy o wasanaethau i deithwyr o Wrecsam.

Gareth Jones: Mewn cyfarfod o Bwyllgor Rhanbarth y Gogledd fis Mawrth diwethaf, clywsoch am y pryder mawr ynghylch cyflwr a safonau gwael gwasanaeth rheilffordd Dyffryn Conwy rhwng Blaenau Ffestiniog a Llandudno. Gofynnwyd i chi ystyried gwella ansawdd y gwasanaeth hwnnw yn y tymor byr, tra bydd gwelliannau yn digwydd i'r A470, ac yn y tymor hir er mwyn cynnal y cymunedau a'r gwasanaethau gwledig hynny sydd mor ddibynnol ar gludiant cyhoeddus. A ydych yn rhoi sylw brys a theilwng i'r mater hwn?

Y Prif Weinidog: Ydym. Mae'r cwestiwn hwn wedi codi o'r blaen, ac yr ydym yn ei drin fel mater brys a theilwng. Q9 Gareth Jones: Will the First Minister make a statement on how the Government of Wales is improving the quality of public transport in north Wales? (OAQ20318)

The First Minister: The Assembly's objectives for improving public transport involve tackling social disadvantage, promoting equality of opportunity, and supporting sustainable development through better co-ordinated and more integrated public transport. These are key to meeting the aspirations of the people of north Wales, and our notable successes include implementing free travel for pensioners and the disabled and, through Assembly funding, improved train services between north and south Wales, offering a greater number of services for passengers from Wrexham.

Gareth Jones: In a meeting of the North Wales Regional Committee last March, you heard of the great concern regarding the poor condition and standards of the rail service in the Conwy Valley between Blaenau Ffestiniog and Llandudno. You were asked to consider improving the quality of that service in the short term, while improvements are made to the A470, and in the long term to maintain those communities and rural services that are so dependent on public transport. Are you giving this matter the urgent attention that it clearly deserves?

The First Minister: Yes. This question has arisen before, and we are treating it as an urgent and deserving matter. While so many roadworks take place between Dolwyddelan and the Crimea near Blaenau Ffestiniog, there will be difficulties for car users, and therefore it will be important to ensure that the train service is available for people who

David Ian Jones: Do you share my concern at the lack of a direct rail link between north Wales and Manchester airport, which is the major international gateway to the region? What do you propose to do to press the rail transport operators to remedy this?

The First Minister: I was not aware that there was no direct rail service between north Wales and Manchester airport. The rail service in the Manchester area covers Manchester airport. It is a well-connected airport, and is a valuable resource to people who live in north Wales. It confers international direct-route travel that is second only to London, which is most convenient for people living only an hour or two away. I was unaware that there was no direct service, via Crewe or another main connecting point for travel from north Wales, and I will write to you when I have researched the position thoroughly.

Eleanor Burnham: The right to use Welsh concessionary tickets on journeys that cross into England depends on agreements between local authorities and the bus operators, whether the English region borders with Wales or not. Do you agree that the Assembly should draw up a specific scheme regarding the boundaries of the regions where the concessionary tickets are used, to avoid confusion for ticket users on such journeys, especially when travelling from north to south Wales?

The First Minister: I have not heard of examples of such confusion. If you write to me, I will consult with Sue Essex to see what we can do. Often, it is more convenient when travelling from south to north Wales, especially to the Wrexham and Deeside area, to go back and forth over the border. Therefore, to ensure that I understand the question correctly, I would be grateful if you would write to me with examples.

Q10 Janet Ryder: Will the First Minister

C10 Janet Ryder: A wnaiff y Prif Weinidog

make a statement on what precautions are being taken to ensure that there are suitable flood defences in place across Wales? (OAQ20293)

The First Minister: We are allocating £38 million for taking precautions against flooding over this and the next three financial years.

Janet Ryder: Developing an early-warning system has worked well in Ruthin. Last weekend, it gave people plenty of warning to move their valuables upstairs although, thankfully, there was no flood. A great deal of work remains before completing Ruthin's flood defences. Are you satisfied that early-warning systems, which were called for after the floods of previous years, are now in place throughout Wales, to ensure that everybody has plenty of warning of an impending flood?

The First Minister: We have not yet received an application for standard grant aid relating to Ruthin. We cannot generate the application because the prime responsibility for that is with the operating authorities—the Environment Agency and local authorities. Denbighshire County Council is promoting the scheme. We can fund it—we have allocated £38 million for it—and we believe that the scheme is fit for purpose, but Denbighshire council has yet to submit a formal application in respect of Ruthin. Therefore, I cannot tell you whether and how the application deals with early-warning systems. We will treat any application that we receive from Denbighshire council with urgency. I hope that the £38 million that we have allocated will cover all the costs required, on the basis of 85 per cent standard grant aid.

John Griffiths: On the flood and coastal defence funding review conducted by the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, do you agree that we must be careful not to lose local knowledge and expertise built up over many years by staff of internal drainage boards, such as the Caldicot and Wentlooge Levels Drainage Board? We must retain local knowledge, along with accountability and direct responsibility, and

must not lose them to a remote, centralised system.

The First Minister: The Caldicot and Wentlooge Levels Drainage Board is a wonderful example—only in Britain could you find anomalies dating back to Henry VIII. The prime responsibility for this lies with Monmouthshire County Council and the Environment Agency. It is possible that nowhere else in the UK has this extra drainage board facility, perhaps because much of that area is below high-tide level, protected by the sea wall. It is important that local knowledge is never lost and, if there is one matter that needs local knowledge, it is trying to gauge the effect of bad weather on an area, in terms of where water will overflow, where the tops of floodbanks will erode and so on. The knowledge available in that drainage board must not be lost in the search for theoretically greater efficiency.

Peter Rogers: One problem in implementing the plans to put up flood defences is that a lot of land relates to old planning applications and purchasers of these plots do not have any information about them. A land search may not return any notification that a house is in an area prone to flooding. Should we not consider amending the legislation so that searches on those properties would provide such details and thus buyers would know exactly what was happening?

The First Minister: You take me back to an early part of my career—I used to undertake the searches in Cardiff City Council's planning department. I cannot remember what year that was, but I did the job for nine months—quite a long period to be doing searches.

It is important to receive accurate information from searches and your solicitor will be expected to undertake a search before you buy a house. You will be aware of the new guidelines regarding building on floodplains and information about them. Some recent high-profile cases have come to the Assembly on appeal, and all four parties in this Assembly would agree on resolving to take greater precautions before permitting

Datganiad ar Brosiect Cau'r Bwlch Statement on the Narrowing the Gap Project

The Minister for Education and Lifelong Learning (Jane Davidson): I am pleased to report to you on the first phase of the 'Narrowing the Gap in the Performance of Schools' project. The report, which everybody has received, focuses on secondary schools, and shows that successful outcomes can be achieved even where school circumstances are challenging.

The impetus for the work came from local government, which asked the Assembly and local government partnership council to examine the factors that contribute towards the gap in performance between schools. The project accords with the Assembly's statutory responsibility to promote equality of opportunity, and is the result of a shared recognition with local government that until the gap between schools that perform the best and those that perform least well is narrowed, we cannot pretend that there is equality of opportunity for school pupils in Wales. There was also a perception that some schools were bucking the trend and succeeding against the odds. The study set out to test that and discover whether there were lessons to be learned for all schools and particularly for those with challenging circumstances.

The evidence that formed the basis for the report came from a variety of sources. The Assembly Government commissioned the National Foundation for Educational Research to draw together information on local education authorities' education strategic plans, and school improvement activity in Wales, and to research school improvement literature. The Assembly's Statistical Directorate and Mike Treadaway of the Fischer Family Trust compiled statistical data. We asked 100 secondary schools across Wales, identified by Estyn and local education authorities as having succeeded ahead of normal expectations for schools in their circumstances, what they considered had led to their success. Twelve schools identified as performing well, despite

Y Gweinidog dros Addysg a Dysgu Gydol Oes (Jane Davidson): Yr wyf yn falch o adrodd i chi ar ran gyntaf prosiect 'Cau'r Bwlch ym Mherfformiad Ysgolion'. Mae'r adroddiad, y mae pawb wedi'i dderbyn, yn canolbwytio ar ysgolion uwchradd, ac yn dangos bod modd sicrhau canlyniadau llwyddiannus hyd yn oed pan yw amgylchiadau'r ysgol yn anodd.

Daeth yr ysgogiad i wneud y gwaith hwn oddi wrth lywodraeth leol, a ofynnodd i'r Cynulliad a'r cyngor partneriaeth llywodraeth leol archwilio'r ffactorau sy'n cyfrannu at y bwlch rhwng perfformiad ysgolion. being in an area of deprivation, were chosen for further study by a project team of three recently retired senior school managers. They visited and talked to the headteachers and senior management teams about the factors that were driving up standards in their schools. The schools that responded to the questionnaire, particularly those that were visited, welcomed the opportunity to give their views and valued the recognition of their achievements implicit in their selection.

The report identifies three factors essential to school improvements: having key personnel in place to drive school improvement, monitoring teaching and learning, promoting effective practice, and making effective use of assessment data. The report recommends that schools identify key personnel and consider how they can contribute to school improvement. That includes consideration of whether the current staffing structure is appropriate. It also asks schools to consider whether there is an appropriate staff development programme to produce and develop key personnel for the future.

Schools need to consider whether staff are well-versed in how pupils learn and whether there are agreed strategies for good teaching. The report recommends that schools should evaluate how effective their systems are for monitoring learning and teaching and ensure that arrangements are in place to identify and disseminate good practice within the school.

Schools should use assessment data to systematically evaluate learning and teaching, and to monitor the progress of individual pupils and groups of pupils. Such assessment provides the basis for setting and monitoring targets, and for identifying action needed to address underperformance by individual pupils or groups of pupils.

The study considered the potential impact of the community dimension of schools in narrowing the gap in performance. The report concludes that developing the community focus of the school as a resource to be used for all ages in the community raises the profile of education, and has the potential to

The report highlights the role of the Assembly Government, local authorities and other key organisations in narrowing the performance gap. Issues covered include support for schools in deprived areas, appropriate levels of funding, the framework for the continuing professional development of teachers, promotion of the school's role in its community, sharing good practice and celebrating success.

I launched the report on 16 October at Sandfields school, in Neath Port Talbot County Borough Council, which was one of the 12 schools that were studied. The report has been issued to all schools, local education authorities and education partners. A conference has been arranged at Merthyr Vale on 21 November to disseminate the findings. I hope that the report's findings will contribute towards the Education and Lifelong Learning Committee's policy review on the school of the future, which has just started.

The partnership council has approved the second phase of the project, focusing on the performance of primary schools. The intention is to complete it by October 2003.

As I said when I launched the report, one of the aspirations shared by the National Assembly and local authorities in Wales is to offer our children true equality of opportunity in their education. We do not achieve that at present. The challenge now for the Assembly, local authorities and schools is to share the good practice that has been identified, so that all our children have excellent opportunities, and no child is disadvantaged because of where they grow up. I commend the report to Members.

Helen Mary Jones: Plaid Cymru welcomes the work that has been done through the narrowing the gap project. It is valuable and it acknowledges the current situation, which, as the Minister has said, is unacceptable. The education system is failing the children and young people from our most deprived communities who, arguably, need it most.

Nid ydym yn cyflawni hynny ar hyn o bryd. Yr her yn awr i'r Cynulliad, yr awdurdodau lleol a'r ysgolion yw rhannu'r arferion da a ganfuwyd, fel y caiff ein holl blant gyfleoedd rhagorol, ac fel na fydd yr un plentyn dan anfantais oherwydd y man y cafaodd ei fagu. Helen Mary Jones: Mae Plaid Cymru yn croesawu'r gwaith a wnaed drwy brosiect cau'r bwlch. Mae'n werthfawr ac mae'n cydnabod y sefyllfa sydd ohoni, sydd, fel y dywedodd y Gweinidog, yn annerbyniol. Mae'r system addysg yn siomi'r plant a'r bobl ifanc yn ein cymunedau mwyaf difreintiedig sef y rhai, gellid dadlau, y mae arnynt ei hangen fwyaf.

I have a few questions arising from the statement. The Minister for Education and Lifelong Learning's statement mentions, in passing, the need for appropriate funding. I press the Minister to acknowledge that there is a strong link between disadvantaged communities and school performance. As we have heard, it is not a determinant—there are schools in deprived communities that perform well—but we must acknowledge the link. Does the Minister share my concern that Assembly funding streams, such as grants for education support and training, do not effectively tackle disadvantage and inequality between schools and that, in some cases, the funding streams may perpetuate those inequalities? Will she tell us what she is doing to address the funding issue and to support the narrowing the gap project's work? Also, will the Minister act urgently to remove competition between schools? The bulk of funding follows individual pupils, which often acts to further weaken schools in disadvantaged communities, and thus serves to widen the achievement gap.

I am glad that this work will be extended to include primary education, as that will be valuable. However, we should also consider performance gaps between further and higher education institutions. Does the Minister share my concern that the proposed introduction of top-up fees for some universities may serve either to create new gaps in attainment, or to widen existing ones between different higher education institutions? Will she assure us today that she will resist any attempt to impose top-up fees here?

Jane Davidson: I am grateful for your comments. The link between disadvantage and school performance is borne out by the report, but it is not a necessary indicator. That is one of this report's most important lessons. Many schools in Wales perform well according to anybody's standards and many operate in areas of deprivation. It is important that we take what works in those schools and ensure that it is disseminated across Wales.

You also referred to the grants for education support and training. We have had a long discussion on that issue—last year we discussed how we wanted the whole programme to more accurately reflect Members' commitment to tackling deprivation. I presented proposals to the Education and Lifelong Learning Committee on how we might do that. This year we have delivered on those proposals and a number of programmes within GEST contained deprivation factors. However, once again, the Committee thought that we should go further; that will mean a fundamental review of GEST. We will focus on how we might get the right kind of grant to deliver the Assembly's agenda for expanding education opportunities within the principles of sustainable development and equal opportunities, and in partnership with local government. That review will be carried out in March.

It is important to say that the report also identified that schools must be a part of the community to be as successful as possible. Once again, it gives us a chance to confirm the importance of the comprehensive school system and to say that having local schools for local communities is the most effective way of tackling the disadvantage gap. One key recommendation from the wide range of partners involved in the report—you will see that wide range in the annex to the report—concerns strengthening existing partnerships between the Welsh Assembly Government, local authorities and the General Teaching Council for Wales. That includes using partnerships to develop the right kind of continuous professional development framework, to help meet national, local, school and individual practitioner needs, to promote the sharing of good practice across Wales, to encourage visits to schools that are making significant progress, to promote and highlight success, and to develop the local education authority and school partnerships, provided for in the Education Act 2002. All these points—including funding—are identified and addressed in the report. The report suggests that we should review the

Brian Gibbons: I was pleased at your reference to Sandfields Comprehensive School in my constituency, which is one of the most improved comprehensive schools in Wales. Equally, Cymer Afan Comprehensive School, of which I am a governor, achieved the honour of being the second most improved comprehensive school in Wales last year. The experience of both those schools demonstrates that if there is good leadership and a commitment to the students—which means that they are entitled to and are able to achieve academic success—it is possible to deliver excellent education. Do you agree that we must learn from the experiences of Sandfields and Cymer Afan comprehensives? Our education system in Wales continues to improve dramatically, despite what the Conservatives have been saying about education performance in Wales during recent months.

Jane Davidson: It is true that our results are improving year on year, and that is also true for those schools performing least well, which is pleasing. However, one of the reasons for drawing up this report was that, although everybody's performance was improving, we were not closing the gap. However, in those schools that have demonstrated a commitment over and above the cohort achievement, the gap has closed much more. Schools that delivered a wider range of vocational opportunities—and there are graphs in the report to demonstrate this—closed the gap quicker and their achievement was much greater. That underpins the proposals that I outlined in the Chamber a few weeks ago about how we will re-examine the education provision for 14 to 19-year-olds and widen opportunities, including vocational ones, for the children of Wales.

Brian Gibbons: Yr oeddwn yn falch o'ch clywed yn cyfeirio at Ysgol Gyfun Sandfields yn fy etholaeth i, sy'n un o'r ysgolion cyfun sydd wedi gwella fwyaf yng Nghymru. Jane Davidson: Mae'n wir bod ein canlyniadau'n gwella flwyddyn ar ôl blwyddyn, ac mae hynny'n wir hefyd am yr ysgolion hynny sy'n perfformio'n lleiaf da, sy'n beth braf. Fodd bynnag, un o'r rhesymau dros lunio'r adroddiad hwn oedd nad oeddem yn cau'r bwlc, er bod perfformiad pawb yn gwella. Jonathan Morgan: We are pleased with today's announcement and with this report's focus on our secondary schools. It demonstrates, as you have said, the huge achievements of our secondary schools in Wales, which has been against difficult backgrounds at times. However, we know that we have a professional and capable teaching profession in Wales, which is delivering on this agenda.

I would like you to consider a few points relating to the report. The first relates to how we monitor the performance and progress of pupils leaving primary school and entering secondary school. We know that key stage 2 tests can be seen as key indicators in assessing the progress of primary school pupils just before they leave to pursue their secondary school studies. Will you consider refusing to bow to pressure from other quarters to abolish key stage 2 tests? I know that we supported your abolition of the key stage 1 tests, but there is an argument for maintaining key stage 2 tests because of the indicators that they are able to provide in terms of monitoring progress.

Secondly, Helen Mary Jones commented on top-up fees. Although that is not directly related to this particular statement, there is an issue of participation and access in the education system. Top-up fees will become a huge issue. I hope that you will consider making the views of the Assembly known to the Westminster Government. We would all be concerned about the introduction of top-up fees and the damage that it would do to participation and access, not only for students wishing to attend higher education institutions in Wales, but also for Welsh students wishing to study throughout the United Kingdom.

On schools being used as community resources, I know, through my consultation with headteachers in south Wales, that they are open to the idea of their schools being used as community resources, particularly in relation to information and communications technology. Do you believe that current budgets are sufficient to enable schools to develop ICT suites, for example, which can

My final point is hugely important with regard to schools in Cardiff. You will be aware that the local education authority is reviewing its funding formula, and this could result in a major redistribution of planned budgetary resources from certain schools to other schools in the city. I know that we all agree with additional resources being allocated to schools that face particular challenges, but we do not want that to happen at the expense of other schools that are delivering and are successful and popular. Helen Mary Jones also raised the issue of mainstream funding, and how we ensure that any funding allocated for tackling the issues you have highlighted are mainstreamed and built into school budgets, so that it can be used effectively. If Cardiff's education authority proceeds with its proposed changes—although it is also considering other recommendations—it could seriously damage many of the city's schools; for example, one primary school could lose as much as £100,000 per year from its budget. How can you raise standards in all schools in Wales if local education authorities are proceeding with these ideas? It will be difficult to raise standards if LEAs rob Peter to pay Paul.

The former Chair of the Committee, Cynog Dafis, was also a member of the narrowing the gap taskforce, which was concerned with consensually delivering on an agenda in Wales. One of the report's key recommendations centres on using assessment data effectively. I know that you set a great deal of store by key stage 2 tests, but they are only part of a panoply of assessment and test material—it is important to say that. New powers on transition are included in the Education Act 2002 and we must consider how we can most effectively deliver the highest possible standard of

Jane Davidson: Yr wyf yn ddiolchgar am eich sylwadau. achievement in primary schools and then maintain that in secondary schools. Therefore, I will not say that we will never abolish key stage 2 tests because we have taken specific powers in the Education Act 2002 to improve achievement between key stages 2 and 3 in Wales, and any changes to the system would be predicated on the outcome of that agenda. We would only make that change if we could demonstrate that we were improving standards at key stage 3.

On top-up fees—I should have responded to Helen Mary Jones on this—we have never had a debate on this subject in the Assembly and it was not discussed in this review. However, I am opposed to top-up fees for two reasons. First, I do not believe that they will benefit our education sector in Wales, as one of our most important agendas is to widen participation. Secondly, the Rees report, which was based on evidence from our independent group, unequivocally concluded that up-front student fees did not just deter those who would have to pay them, but also those who did not have to pay them. Therefore, I have already told the Assembly that I do not believe that we should demand that students pay fees in advance of receiving higher education because that is a disincentive and we want to create incentives. Assembly learning grants act as incentives, and we are delighted that, because of our partnership with the Department for Work and Pensions, people's benefits will not be affected by receiving these grants.

Using schools as a community resource is important, and ICT is part of that. There are some 400 ICT centres for learning at present, and I want that number to expand. This is about the ways in which adults can use school premises. We are keen for schools to expand their community role, and this is an important part of the Education and Lifelong Learning Committee's debate on the school of the future. The power that we have taken in the Education Act 2002, which allows governing bodies to determine a far wider range of activities in school premises than has hitherto been possible, will be helpful in this regard. The School Standards and Framework Act 1998 restricted governing

Mick Bates: Thank you for your statement and your comments on top-up fees. That is an important matter for all Members. Equally, thank you for this interim report. We would all endorse the aim of ensuring equality of opportunity regardless of a pupil's background by narrowing the gap in performance. I have four issues with regard to this report. The first concerns data, for which there are various starting points. However, how do we move forward to ensure that an individual school's efforts are recognised through the added-value measurement of performance rather than just the raw results of examination at the end of a particular key stage or at 16 or 18 years of age?

Secondly, personnel have a particularly important leadership role to play in schools. For teachers—and many of us became teachers as the result of a meritocracy, by passing exams rather than going through a comprehensive system—the leadership aspect is important. How can we assist teachers to fulfil that leadership role when they not only face the pressures of the classroom but also an added bureaucratic burden? How will you ensure that the good work in this report does not increase the bureaucratic burden on the teacher or the school?

Thirdly, placing the school at the centre of the community is fundamental to my belief that education is part of the community. However, how does that reconcile with our views on school closures and the fight for survival facing many small rural schools where language and cultural issues are strong? Will you reinforce the view that we are taking every possible step to retain schools in all communities? I am equally

concerned that the school community should encompass ages 11 to 18, rather than lose those vital years—in a community sense—to further education.

Finally, in terms of continuous professional development, you must consider contract flexibility to ensure that good teacher performance is always retained. In connection with leadership, teachers sometimes face too much pressure to be either full time teachers or supply teachers. Could allowing more flexible job-sharing arrangements in schools narrow the performance gap? I am keen on that, Minister, as it will improve the quality of teaching and therefore narrow the gap.

Jane Davidson: Obtaining data is crucial. Those schools that use data well are able to identify anomalies, for example, in a child's performance in the early part of his or her secondary education and can also predict how well children might perform and work to such an agenda. The best examples of good use of key stage 2 pupil data were often accompanied by a sophisticated and consistent approach to transition. It is in these kinds of schools that you see curricular and pastoral interaction between the primary and the secondary sectors on transition issues. It is an important message for us, and that is why we have taken the powers in the Education Act to make this kind of practice common across Wales.

On job share, despite the fact that local education authorities employ teachers and place them in a particular school, I promote the idea that there is nothing to prevent a teacher from working in more than one school. I recently visited a local authority where this happens, because it is considered a particularly effective means of ensuring successful transition. In that particular case, a science teacher works part time in a secondary school and part time in partner primary schools. Consequently, a relationship is established between children in the final year of primary school and the science teacher who teaches them in secondary school. They have considered the most effective approach. Using this agenda,

schools are now actively considering that approach. Of course, now that we will have unique pupil numbers, we will be able to track performance far more effectively to enable us to address those issues. Value-added data is extremely important but must come through prior to pupil transfer so that we can see what the data means for the pupil and the school. Prior attainment is so important in the secondary school environment. We know from the evidence that there are gaps at primary school level. That must be explored further—hence the introduction of a second phase. The gap grows incrementally in secondary schools and during key stage 3, which is why we must focus hard on key stages 1 and 3.

Leadership is crucial. However, the report clearly points out, and I know this from practice on the ground, that the project does not have to be led by a senior management team. It can be led by other people as a school improvement team, provided that it is embraced fully by the senior management team as well. Any real school improvement must be embraced across the board by those working in the school. That is why initiatives such as Investors in People are important—many schools that perform above expectations have received recognition from Investors in People for their delivery of team work.

The Government has taken several measures to emphasise the partnership collaboration between schools. We have given additional money to rural areas for federation. I have seen examples of good practice with regard to federation of small primary schools and that enables an effective agenda to be delivered.

As regards your points about 11 to 18-year-olds, we have a range of schools in Wales. They are all different, and they all have their strengths. It is not for me as an Assembly Minister to determine relative strength. If we want schools to play a greater part in their community, that option should be as available to the smallest nursery school as it

Datganiad ar Fenter Hawliau Lles **Statement on the Welfare Rights Initiative**

The Minister for Health and Social Services (Jane Hutt): I am pleased to report on the encouraging progress of the 'Better Advice: Better Health' initiative. As you know, I launched the consultation document 'Wellbeing in Wales' in September. That reinforces our efforts to improve health and to reduce inequalities in health through action across all Assembly Government policy areas. 'Better Advice: Better Health' is a good example of our commitment to developing an integrated approach to policies and programmes. It aims to improve the availability of welfare rights advice through the network of GP surgeries. The Assembly has allocated almost £2 million to the programme over three years, beginning in October 2001. It is a partnership between the Assembly and citizens advice bureaux. As you know, the National Association of Citizens Advice Bureaux is a highly skilled organisation that aims to ensure that individuals do not suffer through lack of knowledge of their rights and responsibilities or of the services available to them or through an inability to express their needs effectively.

Free, impartial and confidential advice is provided by CAB trained staff through 125 outlets. Informally, the bureaux had already begun to deliver advice from healthcare settings and had noted that certain vulnerable groups were more likely to access their services in that way. By the provision of general and welfare rights advice in primary care settings across Wales, it is hoped that benefits take-up will be improved. Also, GPs must deal with many clinical problems, the solutions to which are not medical but dependent on improving the patient's quality of life. This initiative is designed to help such patients. The schemes enable GPs to refer patients to expert advisers for benefits and

welfare advice. The objectives of the initiative are to improve the take-up of unclaimed benefits and the income levels of those with the lowest standard of living and to reduce the time that GPs spend resolving non-medical problems. The projects are based in primary healthcare settings. When health professionals are presented with non-medical problems, they can refer patients directly to the CAB. A GP referral helps remove the stigma of using such services and the service is provided in an immediately accessible location. The scheme was piloted in seven areas between October 2001 and March 2002 and the initial assessment is that it has resulted in increased benefits take-up totalling £180,000. Seventy-seven per cent of all inquiries were benefits-related, but there were significant numbers of inquiries relating to debt—one in six of all inquiries in Caerphilly and Wrexham.

Since April, the scheme has been rolled out across Wales and has now been introduced in 17 council areas and in over 90 healthcare settings. These are mostly GP surgeries, but also include some community hospitals. Some services are built around home visits by the advisers. Services will start in the remaining five areas shortly. The location of the services was in some way determined by the accommodation available in GP practices. Priority has been given to areas of social, economic and health deprivation. However, some practices are too small for use by these projects and their location there would hamper the delivery of primary healthcare, therefore other primary care sites were used.

February and May next year, with a final evaluation in November. The agreed evaluation is based on the data collected and collated by the CAB weekly. The information and statistics is in an agreed format that can be produced in monthly all-Wales reports. The National Assembly for Wales receives quarterly reports.

From feedback already received, the early indications are that this project has been greatly welcomed. In particular, Conwy has been approached by the social services 'Supporting People' team with a view to funding additional services and the scheme in Gwynedd has received additional funding from the local authority. District nurses in Denbighshire have included briefing on the project as part of their induction for new staff. The Vale of Glamorgan and Ynys Môn have prioritised mental health service users—a group that often has difficulty accessing benefits. Anecdotal evidence is that GPs are becoming increasingly aware of how to use the CAB advisers to help their patients. All this is most encouraging and I note that CAB in England has approached the Department of Health with the intention of introducing similar schemes across the border.

The 'Better Advice: Better Health' scheme has started well. I thank those citizens advice bureaux across Wales for making this scheme a success. I also thank those GPs who host the services. This is an example of how the Assembly can bring its partners together imaginatively to improve the health and wellbeing of the population.

David Lloyd: We are all aware of the link between deprivation and ill health. Situating bureaux in GP practices has been a welcome initiative. A CAB has been located in my old practice in Fforest Fach for many years. It has worked well. In its first year of operation, around eight years ago, it succeeded in highlighting £71,000 worth of unclaimed benefits in that area of Fforest Fach. The work of the citizens advice bureaux is about improving benefits uptake and the advice available to people because, clearly, GPs are

Determinants of ill health include poverty, unemployment, low pay and poor housing or not being able to afford to live in a house. I wish to address the inadequacy of housing benefit, particularly for young people under 25. It drives many into seeking poor accommodation or even forces them to sleep rough, with obvious implications for their health. Why does the single room rent restriction continue to be in place? It means that the amount of housing benefit that a person under 25 can receive is limited to the estimated cost of renting a single room in that locality. What about young people with families? What is the Welsh Assembly Government doing to abolish the single room rent restriction for young people in Wales? What is it doing about backing a national benefits uptake initiative in Wales? I end by commending the work of the citizens advice bureaux.

Jane Hutt: I am grateful for your positive response. Improving the health of people on low incomes is a key objective of this initiative. Seventy-seven per cent of the inquiries have been benefit-related, as I noted in my statement. This is a national benefit take-up scheme, and the whole population can access it. Housing benefits are not part of my portfolio, but I will raise those issues with the Minister responsible for local government and communities. Many of the issues that you raised are non-devolved matters. I am sure that you have also raised these issues in the Local Government and Housing Committee.

Gwenda Thomas: I welcome today's statement and your commitment to the welfare rights teams. Of the 4,145 incapacity benefit appeals cleared for the Cardiff regional centre between 1 January and 30 September this year, 1,685 appeals—40.7 per cent—was found in favour of the appellant. Will you join me in congratulating the various welfare rights teams for their contribution towards achieving this high success rate?

Jane Hutt: I am grateful to you for bringing that to the Assembly's attention. The number of appeals that were found in favour of the appellant demonstrates the importance of the welfare rights advice given, not only by the CAB, which, as Dai Lloyd said, play an important role in Wales, but also by local authority welfare rights advisers and those who work in the voluntary sector. It also demonstrates that more work must be done across Wales, particularly in terms of incapacity benefits, which are vital to improving the health and wellbeing of people with disabilities and those who cannot work. I strongly endorse your comments.

David Melding: This seems to be a good initiative, and I hope that it succeeds on an all-Wales basis. I note the focus on vulnerable groups, which we all agree is a priority. Many benefits are insurance-based, and many people on relatively low incomes have a right to income support. It is important that those people access all the benefits to which they are entitled. Carers, in particular, often do not claim the benefits to which they are entitled, and this group of people can be easily overlooked. Doctors and those giving advice via the CAB and other organisations should ask themselves who is looking after their patients, as well as whether their patients are also carers.

Jane Hutt: As you said, carers are often not aware of the insurance-based benefits to which they are entitled. We must link this to our carers' strategy. Carers should be able to access this information by way of the new opportunities for carers' assessments. Local authorities should also provide the information. My officials and I will consider this in terms of the carers' strategy. I will also feed your point back to the citizens advice bureaux, as this information must be provided to carers, in terms of their own healthcare and that of the person for whom they are caring.

Kirsty Williams: I am grateful to the Minister for the update, and I welcome the work already carried out throughout Wales. I

Will you give a commitment that, following the evaluation, which, it seems, will be positive, we will mainstream the funding for this project, so that it will become a continuing service? Too often in the past, funds have been set up to develop innovative projects, but the work stops when the funding stream ends because the funding is not then included in the mainstream provision.

Secondly, do you agree that this project's success highlights the fact that GPs, as Dai said, do not necessarily know about everything that is happening in their community, and it is important that they can refer to external bodies in order to advise their patients on welfare benefits? An official should also be appointed in each local health board area to direct patients to a range of organisations that may be able to assist them with the social problems that affect their health, for example, support groups for particular conditions, experts on welfare rights, or the local government advice services that tackle issues arising from poor housing, poor environment or problem neighbours.

Jane Hutt: As you say, the first six months' evaluation has shown that 10 per cent of the inquiries and the support given were related to debt. The evaluation of the three-year project will be important in informing us on the best way to take this initiative forward. In order to mainstream it, we need to understand, through evaluation, which organisations are best placed to provide this advice and guidance. That may be specialist voluntary sector organisations that work closely with particular client groups; local

Bydd y gwerthusiad o'r prosiect tair blynedd yn bwysig o ran ein goleuo ynghyrch y ffordd orau i fwrr ymlaen â'r fenter hon. The key message from the first six months, and from many of the projects that are already up and running and delivering in GPs' surgeries, in community hospitals, and in the home, is that there is a link between health and wellbeing and income levels, particularly in relation to debt and benefit take-up. We must ensure that this is closely scrutinised and monitored throughout the evaluation process.

Brian Hancock: In Islwyn, the citizens advice bureau and Cancercareline, both voluntary services, were operating in poor conditions from portakabins in car parks. The Plaid Cymru-led Caerphilly County Borough Council provided them with premises. Will you congratulate Caerphilly County Borough Council on ensuring that these services continue to provide for the people of Islwyn?

Jane Hutt: Clearly the election campaign is once again upon us. What is happening in Caerphilly, as a result of the 'Better Advice: Better Health' scheme, is positive and encouraging. As a result of working with the local health group and the National Association of Citizens' Advice Bureaux, advice is now being delivered in five GP surgeries. The National Association of Citizens' Advice Bureaux is providing support and direct involvement with local GPs. I am sure that this is working in tandem with the support provided by Caerphilly County Borough Council for citizens advice bureau services in that community.

John Griffiths: This is, as you say, an impressive example of lateral thinking as it links welfare rights with health and wellbeing

Given that the Assembly does not currently have the power to do that, I had understood that the Minister and the Government would make representations to the Westminster Government with a view to securing its support for the abolition of tuition fees. The current tenor of the debate in London suggests that those representations, if indeed they have been made, have fallen on deaf ears. It is vital that the Assembly has an opportunity to debate as soon as possible the proposal to add additional fees to the existing ones so that we can strengthen the Minister's hand in resisting any imposition of top-up fees on universities in Wales and so that we can get answers to key questions, such as whether the Assembly has any power to prevent a system of top-up fees being imposed and, if they are not imposed, how the Minister proposes to address the long-term underfunding of the higher education sector in Wales. If the Business Minister is not prepared to consider making time for a debate, the Minister for Education and Lifelong Learning should, at the very least, make a statement setting out what she proposes to do about the opposition to top-up fees that she has made clear today.

Carwyn Jones: We do not know at present what proposals may be made on top-up fees. It is therefore premature to consider a debate on the subject. If those proposals are strengthened, that will be the time to consider them. I am aware of the situation but, at the moment, it appears to be a one-line proposal without any detail. Peter Rogers: Point of order. I raise this in relation to paragraph 1.5 of the Ministerial Code, which refers to inadequate or inaccurate information from Ministers. My point relates to the chaos that is currently being experienced in communities across Wales with regard to payments under the sheep annual premium scheme. In the Agriculture and Rural Development Committee meeting last Wednesday, the Deputy First Minister and Minister for Rural Development and Wales Abroad undertook that if any farmers were in severe financial difficulties because they had not been paid under the scheme—which is contrary to what English, Scottish and Irish farmers have already received—he would ensure that cheques could be processed manually and paid immediately in order to alleviate such problems. The bank accounts of many of farmers have been frozen. I received a letter from a farmer about a letter faxed to his bank on 31 October promising that a payment would be made into his account the following week. It is now 19 November and the money has still not been transferred to that account.

When I asked a question on truancy to the First Minister last week, he accused me of unintentionally misleading the Assembly as I alleged that truancy was on the increase in Wales. He refused to answer my question on that basis. In the previous week's edition of *The Times Educational Supplement*, under the heading 'Truancy in Wales continues to increase', it was reported that truancy was indeed on the increase. The source of this statement was a report from a group commissioned by the Assembly Government, which was in the Minister for Education and Lifelong Learning's possession and which came before the Education and Lifelong Learning Committee on 24 October. The report clearly states that there has been an increase in unauthorised absences—which means truancy to everyone apart from the First Minister. In the light of this, will the First Minister apologise for misleading the Assembly, for wrongly accusing me of misleading the Assembly and for not answering a question that was, in my opinion, a fair and valid one?

The Presiding Officer: The content of answers is not a matter for me, but it is important that the Ministerial Code is adhered to. The First Minister has heard the comments made.

At a recent meeting called by an Assembly body, at which I was the only Member representing the Assembly, I was the only person that the official responsible had been unable to contact by e-mail. Ironically, it would have been possible for that official to send data to my e-mail address in Aberystwyth but not to my Assembly address. I have mentioned this issue before following a similar event because it seemed to me then, as it does now, that this is a flagrant breach of the protocol for relationships between Assembly Members and Assembly staff as it prevented an official from supporting me in my legitimate work as an Assembly Member. In this recent case, the role that I adopted was purely technical, and I felt that I was representing all 60 Members in a non-party capacity. Clearly, there has been no improvement in the situation since I raised this matter previously. If anything, the gap between officials and Assembly Members has widened. I appeal to the Presiding Officer, who represents the interests of all Assembly Members, to consider the matter and to persuade the Government to remove the block, which is not only absurd and unnecessary, but which may also be breach the protocols agreed by the Assembly.

The Presiding Officer: How the Government operates its ICT system is not a matter for me. However, the interface between ICT systems, as they affect the work of Members and Committees, and the use of ICT by the Cabinet, is a matter for me. Therefore, I will ensure that the House Committee takes another look at this. Over the weekend we have had a change in our ICT domain and our systems, and I think it is appropriate for us to review the resulting situation to ensure that the protocols that we have already approved are adhered to.

The present regulations controlling abortions in Wales have been in place since 1991. It has become apparent that the existing regulations contravene the Human Rights Act 1998, as they only allow women to see the notification form sent to the Chief Medical Officer of their termination if the request is sent via a registered medical practitioner. I therefore propose amending the regulations to allow the notification to be made available to women on receipt of proof of their identity, thereby complying with article 8 of schedule 1 to the Human Rights Act, namely the right to privacy and family life.

It has therefore been necessary to redesign the form to permit the information to be scanned. I am also proposing to include the collection of data about self-reported ethnicity and whether chlamydia screening was offered. Similar

amendments have been introduced in England. I commend the motion to you.

David Davies: I appreciate that these reforms are administrative in nature and will not impact on the number of abortions that take place in this country each year. Nevertheless, I have never understood why the state is prepared to condone the killing of a child that lies in its mother's womb, while it is a serious criminal offence to kill a child outside the womb. It is a tragedy that thousands of lives are deliberately terminated in this fashion each year. It is particularly sad for the mothers involved and for the medical staff who have to perform these unpleasant procedures. The photographs of aborted children on the website of the Society for the Protection of Unborn Children should be enough to make anyone think twice about compromising on abortion. Therefore, as a matter of principle, I will vote against these regulations.

Kirsty Williams: As the Liberal Democrat health spokesperson, I welcome the changes proposed by the Minister for Health and Social Services. It is entirely right and proper that women should not have to apply for information about their health status and healthcare via a general practitioner. They should have the right to apply for that information as individuals. It is appropriate that the right to privacy and a family life, enshrined in the Human Rights Act, is being enacted in Wales in this way. Contrary perhaps to what some people think, it is difficult for most women when they are faced with a decision of this kind. It is not a question of murder; it is a question of women's right to determine how they should live their lives. I understand that it is an issue of individual conscience and I know that feelings run high on this issue. I am sorry that David Davies has chosen this opportunity, of the proposal of reforms which are administrative in nature, to make points that I regard as provocative and emotional in not a very sensible way.

David Melding: The Conservative group has a free vote, as is appropriate. I will vote in favour of these measures, as they are

The internet is not always secure, as I learned to my cost only this week, when I discovered that my credit card had fraudulently been debited with \$5,250 over the internet. Fortunately, that can be remedied and, at the end of the day, it is only money. However, this is a matter of information that is sensitive and important for women, and I wonder whether any electronic means of communication can be devised that is secure enough to satisfy the stringent requirements of confidentiality.

Brian Gibbons: David has just raised an important point. However, we have the innovative new intranet for the NHS in Wales, which is leading the way in Europe. I attended a conference last night where there were people from Europe who had come to learn about our excellent progress in this regard. It is a legitimate concern that needs to be addressed but, of all the health services in Europe, that in Wales is probably leading the way in this.

The Minister for Health and Social Services (Jane Hutt): Any debate on this issue is emotive for some Members and it is a matter of conscience for them as to how they respond. However, this is a technical amendment of regulations relating to the

Abortion is legally permissible in certain prescribed circumstances. We are not asked to judge the morality of the issue but to agree changes to ensure that the necessary administrative procedures connected with terminations of pregnancy comply with the Act and use modern technology to ensure maximum efficiency.

David and Brian's points relate to confidentiality, which is important. Medical practitioners must complete abortion notification forms for each termination of pregnancy performed. The forms are then sent, in confidence, to the Chief Medical Officer. Only staff personally authorised by her are allowed access to the forms to ensure that terminations have been performed in accordance with legal requirements. That data is then anonymised and used to compile national statistics. That also covers the point about security in relation to technology.

These regulations make it possible for local authorities to change the arrangements that were included in their submissions to the Assembly earlier this year. There are two important caveats to that. Local authorities will not be able to change the basic model that they are operating. In other words, the 19 authorities that are operating a leader and cabinet model will not be able to move to a different model, such as the fourth option or a mayoral model. The same will apply to the three alternative arrangements operating.

The second caveat is that authorities will be

In his amendment to the motion to approve the regulations, Jonathan Morgan has proposed that all arrangements made under these regulations should be debated in full council. That is highly ambiguous. If he is proposing that the full council should have its say on approving any changes to the council's constitution made under these regulations, that is already provided for in regulation 7, which states that a resolution of the authority is required. In that case the amendment is superfluous.

If Jonathan Morgan is proposing that the full council should debate any matter that is affected by these regulations, that could result in the full council having to debate matters in relation to functions that have been re-allocated under these regulations. That would be a recipe for chaos as the full council might not have decision-making powers on the matter in question. I sense that this amendment is an attempt to turn the clock back to the days before the Local Government Act 2000 and I urge Members not to support it.

These provisions will allow councils the flexibility they need to fine-tune their constitutional arrangements without allowing them to make fundamental changes so soon after public consultation and the approval of new structures.

Janet Ryder: Yr ydym oll yn gwybod yr hanes y tu ôl i hyn. Cyflwynwyd y newidiadau hyn i greu system penderfynu

decision-making. There have been many debates about whether there should be politically balanced boards or leader and cabinet systems. Whatever those arguments have been—and they have been long and protracted—we have now arrived at the point where we will approve these proposals.

As the Minister highlighted, there is the problem that, once the structures are in place, it is difficult to alter them. Regulation 6 is constrictive and raises the question of how we envisage the role of local government and of how much freedom we should allow it to adapt and change its own structures. These regulations are so prescriptive that, should local authorities even want to change their overview and scrutiny committees, written permission from the Minister is required. Under what circumstances does the Minister envisage not giving permission? What framework will she operate or will we operate a paper framework whereby we agree to every change a council wants? Under what circumstances would the Minister not give permission?

I agree with the Minister on the amendment. Every council has fully debated these changes. Whether we like the decisions or not, they have been reached by full council. Increasingly, we see, in councils where there are party groups that are not large enough to hold an outright majority, the pattern set in the Assembly being followed and Liberal/Labour coalitions emerging. That, frankly, confirms everyone's view that the Liberal/Labour Party is one party now. Some may not like the decisions that have been reached under some of these constitutions. Conwy County Borough Council is a prime example. Many councillors and residents are still unhappy about the arrangements there. However, the Liberal/Labour group has taken them through and, unfortunately, we will now approve them. I ask the Minister to clarify what is meant under regulation 6, and to say under what circumstances she would not approve an application for change.

The Presiding Officer: As reference has been made to the amendment in the name of Jonathan Morgan, I confirm that there is no amendment to the motion on the principle of the regulations. However, there is an amendment to the motion to approve the draft Order in accordance with Standing Order No. 22.10. A motion under Standing Order No. 22.10 and, by implication, any amendment to that motion, should be voted on immediately without debate. On this occasion, in the spirit of pre-Advent generosity that is already taking over, I have decided to allow discussion on that motion and amendment. However, the amendment will be formally proposed later with the motion to approve the Order. In future, when Members are considering whether to table amendments to a motion to approve an Order under Standing Order No. 22.10, they should not take this generosity on my part as setting a precedent.

William Graham: I am grateful for your generosity on this occasion. I speak to the principle of the regulations. The Local Government Act 2002, which was designed to increase the transparency of local government decision-making and therefore to allow wider public scrutiny, ordered councils to adopt new decision-making structures. They had to give up the traditional committee system and instead put power in the hands of an elected mayor or a leader ruling through a cabinet. Most councils in Wales opted for the leader and cabinet model. Councillors now feel disenfranchised. The Labour-dominated parliamentary Select Committee on Transport, Local Government and the Regions has concluded that the Act has failed on almost all counts.

We do not need to look to Labour Members of Parliament to realise that the cabinet structure introduced under this legislation is undemocratic and fails to widen transparency, increase accountability or broaden the scrutiny of local authorities. The majority of political analysts and commentators agree that Labour bullied councils into adopting the mayoral and cabinet system at a local level, thereby

These regulations are enabling measures that will allow improvements to local government structures. There is hardly a county councillor whom I meet these days who does not complain about the restrictive process that the Act placed upon them. They feel excluded rather than included in local government. I am pleased that Liberal Democrats in both Houses of Parliament fought to introduce the fourth option. Powys County Council, in its wisdom, adopted that option. I am sure that more councils will follow suit once the Labour barons realise the error of their ways. In supporting these regulations, I welcome the greater transparency that they will bring to councils.

The Finance Minister (Edwina Hart): I do not accept William Graham's points as I believe that the system has bedded down and worked well in Wales. Local government will welcome these regulations because they will allow councils to address the minor problems that have come to light during the process of bedding down the new structures. Local authorities have approached me on this issue and I have tried to help them with the system as much as possible. I say to Janet that I would like to do the same in terms of the restrictions that now exist.

It is only right and proper that local authorities should not be able to change their model or make fundamental changes without my consent. However, if necessary, we could consider including in future regulations a power of direction to force authorities to consult before deciding on a change to their constitutions. Despite the protests from some directions, I am satisfied with the structural

**National Health Service Foundation Hospitals

The Deputy Presiding Officer: I have selected amendments 1 and 2 in the name of Carwyn Jones.

David Melding: I propose that

the National Assembly endorses the concept of national health service foundation hospitals. (NDM1218)

Members will know that the establishment of foundation hospitals was a key element of the Queen's Speech delivered last week. It is important that this policy development be extended to Wales, either in Mr Milburn's measures or via the NHS (Wales) Bill. Some Members may ask why we should follow England. That is a fair question, as it would be perfectly legitimate to develop a different policy in Wales. However, any difference between England and Wales in such a major policy area has to be fully justified and the people of Wales must be told why the course we are following in Wales is different from that to be followed in England. The course to be taken in England is regarded as fundamental to the delivery of effective NHS hospital care in the twenty-first century.

David Melding: Cynigiaf fod

Mae hwnnw'n gwestiwn teg, gan y byddai'n gwbl gyfiawn datblygu polisi gwahanol yng Nghymru. Fodd bynnag, rhaid llwyr gyfiawnhau unrhyw wahaniaeth rhwng Cymru a Lloegr mewn maes polisi mor bwysig a rhaid dweud wrth bobl Cymru pam y mae'r llwybr yr ydym yn ei ddilyn yng Nghymru'n wahanol i'r un sydd i'w ddilyn yn Lloegr. Ystyrir bod y llwybr a ddilnwir yn Lloegr yn hanfodol i ddarparu gofal effeithiol mewn ysbytai GIG yn yr unfed ganrif ar hugain.

Members may gain a better understanding of the issue if I explain the status of foundation hospitals. The foundation hospital model is different to the current model under classic Labour, or whatever the First Minister now calls the Labour Party in Wales. Foundation hospitals would be financially autonomous, non-profit-making organisations that would have to use all their finances for the delivery of NHS healthcare. They would also be independent of Government interference. It is important to acknowledge that the hospitals would be licensed and regulated. I had hoped that the hospitals would have the right to borrow, but it seems that Mr Milburn did not quite win that argument with the Chancellor. Perhaps the Chancellor is the last person who can save the Labour Party in Wales, as I fear that the Prime Minister is already condemning Labour Party policy in Wales and its highly centralised, socialist approach.

Dafydd Wigley: You said that all resources would have to be used for the delivery of NHS healthcare. Does that rule out the use of facilities in such institutions for private practice?

David Melding: I do not want to discuss private practice. It is probably better if that is not confused with what we are proposing. If private practice were delivered in NHS facilities, we could compromise the principle involved. It could only ever be justified if NHS care would stand to gain significantly from the resources generated. I emphasise that foundation hospitals would follow partnership with the private sector. For instance, in the provision of effective elective care, hospitals could enter into contracts with the private sector and deliver such care locally using such facilities. That would be an important aspect of provision. The foundation hospital model offers a different way of proceeding from the socialist model that currently has free rein in Wales. New Labour has at least returned to the old concept of autonomous trusts, which were being developed under the Conservative Party when it was in Government, and moved forward in the early 1990s.

Efallai y bydd yr Aelodau'n deall y pwnc yn well os egluraf statws ysbytai sefydledig. Mae model yr ysbytai sefydledig yn wahanol i'r model presennol dan Lafur clasurol, neu beth bynnag y mae Prif Weinidog Cymru'n galw'r Blaid Lafur yng Nghymru'n awr. Byddai ysbytai sefydledig yn gyrrf ariannol ymreolus nad ydynt yn gwneud elw a fyddai'n gorfod defnyddio eu holl gyllid i ddarparu gofal iechyd y GIG. Byddent yn annibynnol hefyd ar ymyrraeth y Llywodraeth. Mae'n bwysig cydnabod y cai'r ysbytai eu trwyddedu a'u rheoleiddio. Dafydd Wigley: Dywedasoch y byddai'n rhaid defnyddio'r holl adnoddau i ddarparu gofal iechyd GIG. A yw hynny'n dileu'r posiblirwydd o ddefnyddio cyfleusterau mewn sefydliadau o'r fath ar gyfer ymarfer preifat?

David Melding: Nid wyf am drafod ymarfer preifat. Mae'n debyg ei bod yn well peidio â'i gymysgu â'r hyn yr ydym yn ei gynnig. Os cai ymarfer preifat ei ddarparu mewn cyfleusterau GIG, gallem beryglu'r egwyddor dan sylw. Ni ellid ond ei gyflawnhau os gallai gofal GIG elwa'n sylweddol ar yr adnoddau a gynhyrchid. Pwysleisiaf y byddai ysbytai sefydledig yn dilyn partneriaeth â'r sector preifat. Er enghraift, wrth ddarparu gofal dewisol effeithiol, gallai ysbytai wneud cytundeb â'r sector preifat a darparu gofal o'r fath yn lleol gan ddefnyddio cyfleusterau o'r fath. Byddai hynny'n agwedd bwysig ar ddarparu. Mae model yr ysbytai sefydledig yn cynnig dull gwahanol o weithredu i'r model sosialaidd sy'n cael rhwydd hynt yng Nghymru ar hyn o bryd. I give New Labour two cheers, but it has not gone far enough. A problem with the Labour Party's proposals in England is that they will only be extended to a limited number of hospitals in the first instance. However, since the criticism was made that a two-tier system could occur because foundation status would not be universal and open to all NHS hospitals, the Department of Health has said that it expects all hospitals in England to go down this route and have foundation status within five to 10 years. That is what will be done in England. In Wales, the concept of foundation hospitals will not be followed, now or in future, if the Labour Party remains in control.

The concept of foundation status has been backed by the British Medical Association and the NHS federation. Naturally, the BMA wants more details, which is a fair point. Dr Ian Bogle welcomed

'the escape from unnecessary bureaucracy, and an unfettered ability to develop new ways of delivering better patient care. These freedoms ought to be available to all hospitals'.

The Welsh Conservatives' policy is that the freedoms would be available to all hospitals. That is an important difference. The Conservative Party is united in wanting to extend this principle to all hospitals, whereas the Labour Party in England will limit it in the first instance and, as far as we know, the Labour Party in Wales will not go down this route at all. The Labour/Liberal Democrat Government is determined to preserve what I consider to be a highly centralised, bureaucratic and socialist model. We are not being pejorative about this, as many people would argue that a socialist model is the best model to deliver universal NHS healthcare. However, it must be justified. In our view, this model is not succeeding and neither is it the best way to secure universal healthcare, which, I assume, is the ultimate objective for every Member. Plaid Cymru seems to agree with a socialist model but it is likely to propose a different structure. I say 'likely' because, for Plaid Cymru, this is work in progress, which is slightly bizarre in the run

Rhoddaf ddwy floedd i Lafur Newydd, ond nid yw wedi mynd yn ddigon pell. Un broblem ynghylch cynigion y Blaid Lafur yn Lloegr yw na fyddant ond yn cynnwys nifer fach o ysbytai yn y lle cyntaf. Fodd bynnag, oherwydd y feirniadaeth y gallai system ddwy haen godi am na fyddai statws ysbyty sefydledig yn gyffredin ac yn agored i'r holl ysbytai GIG, mae'r Adran Iechyd wedi dweud ei bod yn disgwyl y bydd yr holl ysbytai yn Lloegr yn dilyn y llwybr hwn ac yn meddu ar statws ysbyty sefydledig o fewn pump i 10 mlynedd. up to Assembly elections. However, it seems that it will propose a system using 15 of the old-style health authorities that existed before the reforms of the late 1980s. I do not think that that will work, but Plaid Cymru will have to justify its policy to the electorate.

It is good that the Welsh electorate will have clear alternatives from which to choose when they vote in the Assembly election in May 2003. The Conservative Party will propose a full foundation hospital model, taking the policy even further than New Labour will take it in England.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: It is always difficult to react when David proposes such ideas, as this is the 'David Melding caring-sharing' form of Conservative philosophy, which is the almost-acceptable face of the Conservative Party in Wales. Unfortunately, we remember what the Conservative Party did to the health service in Wales. The Minister for Health and Social Services and the current Labour administration have, unfortunately, continued that trend. Why will you not invest in a health service that everyone can access on the basis of need, rather than move towards a two-tier system under which some people will receive an excellent service while others will be left with no service whatsoever?

David Melding: I deny that it would be a two-tier system. The challenge facing us is how we can deliver effective, universal and timely hospital care, a system which people can be confident will provide them with a service when they need it. The current system is failing people, and I believe that a new system, based on the foundation hospital concept, would have a good chance of succeeding. It would, unfortunately, be compromised under a Labour Government. However, under a Welsh Conservative Government it would regenerate the NHS, thus leading to the preservation of universal healthcare, which is the fundamental principle in which we believe.

Rhodri Glyn Thomas: Mae bob amser yn anodd ymateb pan yw David yn cynnig syniadau o'r fath, gan mai ffurf ofalgar gyfrannog David Melding ar athroniaeth Geidwadol yw hon, sef wyneb bron yn dderbynol y Blaid Geidwadol yng Nghymru. Gwaetha'r modd, cofiwn yr hyn a wnaeth y Blaid Geidwadol i'r gwasanaeth iechyd yng Nghymru. Yn anffodus, mae'r Gweinidog dros Iechyd a Gwasanaethau Cymdeithasol a'r weinyddiaeth Lafur bresennol wedi parhau â'r tuedd hwnnw. Pam na wnewch fuddsoddi mewn gwasanaeth iechyd y gall pawb ei ddefnyddio ar sail angen, yn hytrach na symud tuag at system ddwy haen lle y bydd rhai'n cael gwasanaeth rhagorol ac eraill yn cael eu gadael heb wasanaeth o gwbl?

David Melding: Gwadaf y byddai'n system ddwy haen. Yr her a wynebwn yw sut y gallwn ddarparu gofal ysbyty effeithiol, amserol ar gyfer pawb, system y gall pobl fod yn ffyddio y bydd yn rhoi gwasanaeth iddynt pan fo arnynt ei angen. Cynog Dafis: Gadewch inni fod yn ymarferol ynglŷn â hyn, ac ystyried y De-orllewin, lle y ceir tair ymddiriedolaeth a phedwar ysbty cyffredinol—yn Llanelli, Caerfyrddin, Hwlfordd ac Aberystwyth. Pe gwneid un o'r ysbtyai hynny yn ysbty sefydledig, beth fyddai'r effaith ar yr ysbtyai eraill?

David Melding: It is vital that the current structure of general hospitals, which I define as a hospital with an accident and emergency department, is maintained. There is no agenda to cut the number. I state that absolutely. The number of acute general hospitals with accident and emergency facilities will be the same under this system—

Cynog Dafis rose—

David Melding: I am not giving way again. I have spoken for eight and a half minutes. If you speak in this debate, Cynog, I will try to intervene and address this issue further.

Is the current system working under Labour? Can we have confidence in this highly bureaucratic, socialist model? Despite the rapid increase in health expenditure—and it has been rapid, unprecedented even—fewer patients are treated now than before the advent of the Assembly. That is a terrible condemnation of the performance of the Assembly Government to date. In-patient activity during the last year has fallen by 1 per cent and new out-patient activity in the last year has fallen by 1.5 per cent, despite the record levels of expenditure. Productivity in the NHS is now at its lowest level for a decade.

Labour has succeeded in one area: the number of bureaucrats has vastly increased at three times the rate of doctors and nurses. There are 9 per cent more bureaucrats under the Labour Party compared with 3 per cent more front-line staff. At least there has been some increase, but nothing like the level of increase for bureaucrats. However, there is a high vacancy rate among front-line staff, which is at record levels and is a running problem.

Cynog Dafis: Let us view this in practical terms, and consider south-west Wales, where there are three trusts and four general hospitals—in Llanelli, Carmarthen, Haverfordwest and Aberystwyth. If one of those hospitals were to be designated a foundation hospital, what would be the effect on the other hospitals?

David Melding: Mae'n hollwysig cadw'r strwythur presennol o ysbtyai cyffredinol, sef ysbty ag adran ddamweiniau ac achosion brys, yn ôl fy niffiniad i. Nid oes bwriad i gwtogi'r nifer. Cynog Dafis a gododd—

David Melding: Nid wyf am ildio eto. Yr wyf wedi siarad am wyt munud a hanner. Os siaradwch yn y ddadl hon, Cynog, ceisiaf ymyrryd ac ymdrin â'r mater ymhellach.

A yw'r system bresennol yn gweithio o dan Lafur? A allwn ymddiried yn y model sosialaidd, tra biwrocrataidd hwn? Er gwaethaf y cynnydd sydyn yn y gwariant ar iechyd—bu'n sydyn, ac yn ddigyffelyb hyd yn oed—caiff llai o gleifion eu trin yn awr na chyn dyfodiad y Cynulliad. Mae hynny'n gondemniad ofnadwy ar berfformiad Llywodraeth y Cynulliad hyd yn hyn. Mae'r gweithgaredd cleifion mewnol yn ystod y flwyddyn ddiwethaf wedi gostwng o 1 y cant ac mae gweithgaredd cleifion allanol newydd yn y flwyddyn ddiwethaf wedi gostwng o 1.5 y cant, er gwaethaf y gwariant mwyaf erioed. Mae Llafur wedi llwyddo mewn un maes: mae nifer y biwrocratiaid wedi cynyddu'n aruthrol, dair gwaith yn gyflymach na nifer y meddygon a'r nyrssys. Mae 9 y cant yn fwy o fiwrocratiaid o dan y Blaid Lafur o'i gymharu â 3 y cant yn fwy o staff rheng flaen. Bu rhywfaint o gynnydd o leiaf, ond dim byd tebyg i'r cynnydd yn nifer y biwrocratiaid. Er hynny, mae cyfradd uchel o swyddi gwag yn y staff rheng flaen, sydd ar ei huchaf erioed ac yn broblem barhaus.

Waiting lists, as we know, have soared under the Labour Party. The Minister for Health and Social Services proposed to reduce in-patient waiting lists to 65,500 by March 2001. Currently, that figure is 72,400. Long after March 2001, she has failed to deliver on her commitment—waiting list figures are now running at way over her promise. Out-patient waiting lists have increased from 101,000 in 1997 to 238,000 today. That is a staggering increase.

What about the way forward? Some people suggest that we should not have foundation status in Wales because we could do things differently and that you cannot go down this route if you want an effective universal service. Foundation hospitals are popular in Europe where there is universal healthcare. They are used in Denmark and Sweden—Denmark is a small country and Sweden is smallish. They are also used in Spain, so this model has been endorsed across Europe. It is the only way to regenerate the effectiveness of hospital NHS healthcare in this country. Not only is the NHS safe in the hands of the Welsh Conservative Party, but only in our hands can we have effective NHS hospital care for the twenty-first century. Ours is the only party with the vision to secure this outstanding public policy priority.

Our policy is to have 15 foundation hospitals; to answer Cynog's question about whether we would cut the number of trusts—we would not. We would have 22 primary care trusts. Primary care continues to be an effective service in this country, thankfully, although it needs careful nurturing to ensure that it does not encounter the kind of crisis that we have recently experienced in hospital care. We would also have an all-Wales independent health body, giving new hope to the patients of Wales. The only hope for an effective NHS at hospital level is to implement this sort of dramatic change in terms of moving away from the socialist model of the Minister for Health and Social Services—a change that will secure effective care for the people of Wales.

The NHS needs to be funded fully through taxation and any talk of different funding streams would only confuse matters at the moment and raise all sorts of spectres. We do not want that to happen. We want to reform the structure of the NHS so that it is an effective service.

The amendments are slightly timid. I suspect that there is a lingering respect from the Business Minister for our motion. If those amendments are carried, we will abstain. I will not give the Business Minister the opportunity to say that we voted against the current structure of general hospitals. We would preserve that. However, it needs to be reformed and based on the foundation hospital basis.

David Lloyd: As we have all been so keen to read each other’s policies and manifestos in recent weeks, I begin with a quote:

‘The Government believes that self-government for hospitals will encourage a stronger sense of local ownership and pride, building on the enormous fund of goodwill that exists in local communities. It will stimulate commitment and harness the skills of those who are directly responsible for

David Lloyd: Gan y buom oll mor awyddus i ddarllen polisiau a maniffestos ein gilydd yn yr wythnosau diweddar, dechreuaf â dyfyniad:

Mae'r Llywodraeth yn credu y bydd hunanlywodraeth i ysbytai'n hybu ymdeimlad cryfach o berchnogaeth a balchder lleol, gan adeiladu ar sail y stôr enfawr o ewyllys da a geir mewn cymunedau lleol. Bydd yn ysgogi ymrwymiad ac yn harneisio sgiliau'r rhai sy'n uniongyrchol

providing services.'

Guess who said that. Tony Blair? Alan Milburn on foundation hospitals? Could be. It sounds so much like New Labour. It is, in fact, from 'Working for Patients'—the solid, squalid Conservative document, which inaugurated the discredited internal market in the NHS in 1989. Clearly, the Tories endorse the concept of foundation hospitals because it has been one of their aims for over a decade. Now New Labour are putting old Tory thought into effect. The Tories are clear: foundation hospitals are a step along the road to the break-up and privatisation of the NHS.

We, in Plaid Cymru, are clear. We oppose the concept of foundation hospitals because we agree with the Tories that it will result in exactly what they state. Plaid Cymru will vote against this motion because the concept of foundation hospitals is the antithesis of everything that we believe the health service should be. Foundation hospitals are stand-alone, self-financing institutions. They will be outside the control of the Department of Health and semi-detached from the NHS. Their financial and clinical guidelines will be set by the powerful lobbies within them. They will fragment care, hamper strategic regional planning and concentrate on quicker, easier, cheaper surgery to keep their privileged status. If you live near a foundation hospital, do not have a complicated illness, do not be elderly and do not be mentally ill. Foundation status will only be given to the best hospitals, laying the foundations for a two-tier system of healthcare. Poor you if you find yourself in one of the poor hospitals if this is implemented. We have been here before in health, education and the economy. The strong get stronger at the expense of the weak: redistribution that is most perverse—Robin Hood in reverse.

Therefore, our case is clear. We will not endorse the concept or the practice—we oppose it completely. What about New Labour in Wales? Where does it stand and what does it make of foundation hospitals? It notes foundation hospitals—what wonderful

It tries to run with the hare and the hounds—a lesson it is learning from Alun Michael in his new job. It tries to please Millbank, knowing that its supporters here will not wear it. It is caught. Imagine the debate in the New Labour group this week—which way do we go? What do we say? How do we get out of this?

I challenge the Government: is the concept of foundation hospitals a good or bad one? I want straight answers. However, I am sure I will not get them. After all, what can you expect from a Government whose answer to the worst health statistics is to press for lock, stock and barrel restructuring? Eighty-three thousand people have been waiting over six months to see a consultant. What is the answer to that? The creation of 54 new bodies. Over 250,000 people are on waiting lists in a country with a population of barely 3 million. What is the answer? Local partnership quangos. How my poor, suffering patients love it—the list of poor, suffering patients continues to grow.

The waiting list increases by 1,000 people a month, every month that this Government is in office. Talk about not sticking to your manifesto: in May 1999, we were promised that waiting lists would be down to zero. What a mess Plaid Cymru will inherit in May. We are clear about what needs to be done. If the 54 pieces are in place, it will be our job to try to get them working together again. Our big idea is capacity. We have just listened to 14 minutes of David Melding. Whatever structure exists will be refocused to deliver more doctors, nurses, health workers and equipment as its main priority.

The Tories obviously endorse the concept of foundation hospitals. They are clear, consistent and wrong. Plaid Cymru condemns the concept of foundation hospitals. We are clear, consistent but right. Where does New Labour in Wales stand? It is

Glyn Davies: A very good friend of mine is a GP in mid Wales. Despite that, he enthusiastically supported fundholding and tells me that it changed his attitude towards healthcare management. In Powys, fundholding was very successful—ask GPs if you do not believe me. Before fundholding, my GP friend had been wedded to the command and control philosophy that seems to permeate every utterance from our Minister for Health and Social Services and from our First Minister.

I knew that the NHS in Wales faced difficulties, but even I was shocked when my GP friend told me last week that, since the end of fundholding, morale in the NHS—in which he has spent his lifetime working—has fallen so far that he believes that the whole NHS structure will have to be dismantled. I responded that the Conservatives believe in evolution rather than revolution, and want to modernise the NHS by making it more effective without damaging it. Unfortunately, Wales has a First Minister so consumed with encyclopedic detail of people and events in Welsh history that he seems totally unable to cope with any modernising agenda.

The position in Wales is deteriorating. I have received a rather ironic letter from the National Blood Service inviting me to give blood; I have been a regular donor for 25 years. The letter thanks me for my support, and informs me that only with my help can the service ensure that patients receive the treatment they need. It states that the National Blood Service is now treating patients within shorter waiting times, and that the supply of blood is essential to this success. Of course, the letter came from Liverpool in England. It

could not, accurately, have been written in Wales.

A few weeks ago, I called at a local GP surgery, just after one of the GPs had read his mail. He was so outraged by one letter that he gave me a copy of it, with the patient's name blacked out, of course. It was from an orthopaedic surgeon at the world-famous Robert Jones and Agnes Hunt Orthopaedic Hospital at Gobowen in Shropshire, brutally informing him that his patient could not be treated because he lived in Wales. He would have been treated if he lived in England. This hospital serves the whole of north and mid Wales. I met with the chief executive of the hospital—which is not to be criticised in any way—and it appears that the hospital is contracted to supply a much poorer service in Wales than it is in England and the position is getting worse. The only response that we hear from the Minister for Health and Social Services and from the First Minister is repetition of their unshakeable belief that higher levels of spending in health demonstrates their good faith and commitment. I do not doubt their good faith and commitment, but growing evidence suggests that something should be done to change the approach to healthcare delivery in Wales. To make matters worse, we in Wales can observe the Labour Government at Westminster doing just that. It is beginning to look at ways to introduce patient and consumer-led practices into the NHS and to pluralise the provision of healthcare. Next month we expect to see the first foundation hospital named in England.

Peter Black rose—

Glyn Davies: In a second, Peter. The Secretary of State for Health who, at one time seemed terminally infected by the command and control mentality, is now repenting and putting patients before dogma. A lot more patients in Wales will feel better because of it.

You seem to completely forget this point, as do other Assembly Members, whenever you start attacking the Conservatives. The position is much worse since we left office.

Of course, foundation hospitals would not suddenly end every problem faced by the NHS but they would create new thinking and innovation, and make the professionals, who have always given so much to the NHS in Britain, feel involved in the service in which they work.

Peter Law: This is an important debate, and we should not be misled by some of the comments that we have heard. This is a Tory party nominated debate, and I will be happy to address them in a moment. I listened to Dai Lloyd's well-rehearsed speech. He has practised well since his destabilisation last week. However, we will not have foundation hospitals in Wales because we have devolution, and because the Labour Government gave us a National Assembly—

Ieuan Wyn Jones: You seem to forget, Peter, that the National Assembly does not have legislative powers. The Bill to introduce foundation hospitals will include Wales.

Peter Law: I take every confidence from my friend, the First Minister, who has announced publicly that we will not have foundation hospitals in Wales. I am sure that you will hear something from my friend, the Minister for Health and Social Services, in future. We can do it differently under devolution—that is what it is all about. It is touching to hear Plaid Cymru Members' concern for foundation hospitals in England—half of them do not recognise England's existence most of the time. We can do it differently now in Wales, thanks to a Labour Government and to record funding from a Labour Chancellor. That is an important point.

To turn to the Conservatives—they are the champions of privilege and inequality. They put David Melding up to speak first as a charm offensive. I would much rather if they had put up a real, rough right-winger such as

Every Tory in Wales ought to be branded, as an NHS health warning, so that people know who they are, because we will never forget that. We must never go back to those days. When they talk—

Alun Cairns: Peter talks about the dark Tory years. However, would he not be glad to return to the waiting list figures that were left by the last Conservative Government, rather than the figure of 83,000 people on the waiting lists that this Labour Government will leave?

Peter Law: I am certain that the Minister for Health and Social Services, with the record resources available to her under this Government, is positively pursuing the best interests of all patients in Wales. I will remind you of a few issues under Tory rule. Dai Lloyd briefly referred to the discrimination that the Tories operated. We all remember the fundholding practices. I remember them well, because in Blaenau Gwent there was one fundholding practice and every one else had to wait. If you were in a fundholding practice you received priority, and if you were not, you were at the back of the queue. That was the Tory philosophy. We all remember—

Glyn Davies: I accept the position in Blaenau Gwent, Peter. However, do you accept that in other parts of Wales, in Powys for example, every GP practice was fundholding except for one, and they were a huge success?

Peter Law: That is a much better-off area, where people have at least five years more life expectancy than anyone in Blaenau Gwent, so the doctors were happy to go to those places—their pockets were lined with

Brian Gibbons: Do you also agree, Peter, that if you considered the geographical distribution of fundholding, not just in Wales, but throughout the United Kingdom, by and large it was concentrated in suburban, middle class areas, which were given preferential treatment? The inverse care law of fewer services and less funding to the most needy areas continued under fundholding. That is consistent with Conservative policy. That was the reality: those who had, got more, those who had least got less.

Peter Law: You are right. I have heard you say that before, and I have acknowledged it. They did not prioritise the people who needed care the most. That is how the Tories have always dealt with things. It is ‘them’ and ‘us’—as long as we are all right, never mind about them. That is how it has always been. We now have, as David Melding put it, a socialist model in Wales, of which I am proud. That is how we want to go forward. The public is happy with public services provided by good, professional, public staff. It is confident about that.

Let us consider some of the things that the Tories introduced, such as grant maintained schools and the division that that caused—I mentioned other matters earlier—the internal market, where managers used to meet each other every year coming back from negotiating contracts when resources used to run out, and no operations were being carried out. When we consider the structure of the health service we remember how the Tories surreptitiously parachuted in 30 plus trusts over night without consultation. I had to listen to that last week. The Minister for Health and Social Services’ proposals for reorganising the health service structure in Wales are revolutionary as far as empowering communities in deprived areas is concerned. At last, people in my community will not be told, ‘that will do’—they can decide their choices with a board made up of all the professionals and democratically elected people. That is what democracy is about. It is not the command and control of potential—

Peter Law: I was opposed to how health trusts were brought in. In fact, I chaired a health trust for a while, before Members throw that back at me. The future for us is not with foundation hospitals, as has been suggested. There should be no more discrimination. Everyone should have an opportunity to play a part in their community. We should go forward positively with a vibrant NHS that is in the interest of all the people of Wales. That is why we do not need foundation hospitals, and why the Minister's proposals will be right.

Nick Bourne: I listened with interest to Peter Law. He is always great value, but the trouble with his thesis is that everything that Labour does is always right. However, you must make a choice today. Peter. You must either go with Labour at Westminster, or with Labour here. I suspect from the absence of most Ministers, that you would be better off going with Labour at Westminster on this one.

Peter Law: The Conservatives did not understand the concept of devolution: you all voted 'no' to it, but you are in here on the sinecure of enjoying the full privileges of Assembly Members. However, devolution means that you do things differently—do you not acknowledge that?

Nick Bourne: Like many people in Blaenau Gwent, not least your Member of Parliament, I was not convinced of the virtue of the Assembly, but we have moved on since then, as you would be the first to acknowledge, I am sure.

You have been preaching about a system of state control that was old hat in ancient Greece. The sort of socialist dogma that is put forward by the Minister for Health and Social Services has not served the people of

That is where we would part company with Labour at Westminster, because it wants to give it to the so-called best foundation hospitals. That is a two-tiered system. We want all of Wales's hospitals to have foundation status. That would give power to patients and communities, and would take it away from politicians. The Minister for Health and Social Services is against that, never mind that it will engender greater innovation, greater diversity, and better services reflecting local needs, or that it will assist in the fight to cut waiting lists and improve patient care as it has done in Spain, Sweden and Denmark. It is genuine decentralisation and depoliticisation but it is a threat. It is a threat to the socialist dogma of command and control, which means that the people of Wales will be forced to make do with a system of healthcare that was dismantled by the countries in eastern Europe as soon as the communist regimes were swept aside.

We are sometimes accused of being old fashioned but the kind of remedies being presented by the Minister were discredited in the days of ancient Rome and ancient Greece. Why should we tolerate a healthcare system that delivers today's waiting lists? We know that it is not because of a lack of resources. The Secretary of State for Health correctly stated that there is no automatic correlation between tax-funded healthcare and healthcare run simply by central Government, and that extra spending alone is insufficient to deliver improvements in public services. I hope that he has passed that on to the Assembly's Minister for Health and Social Services. It is a shame that she has not been listening. If Labour were on certain territory here, we would have heard much crowing and braying from them. We are about to hear from one of the old people of the ancient Greece philosophy—

Nick Bourne: Hans Christian Andersen stuff. When you cannot contribute to the debate, you bring up the same old nostrums about our time in power. We treated more people than are being treated now, and with more money. As somebody with some medical experience and knowledge, it should cause you serious concern. Why on earth do you not apply that knowledge to help patients rather than helping politicians? I am fed up with having to stand here and find that the Minister is not open to argument, is unwilling to reconsider, wants to spend more money on more bureaucracy and fewer patients—

Nick Bourne: I am not giving way. It is high time that the Minister listened to somebody other than the same old tired Labour politicians with the same old answers. If Alan Milburn can learn the lesson, why cannot Jane Hutt?

Kirsty Williams: I welcome the opportunity to debate a different aspect of the NHS this week. The debate throws up some interesting paradoxes. The Conservative Party, both in London and in the National Assembly, wholeheartedly support a Labour Government policy. Alarm bells should ring immediately. In addition, Labour in London is proposing a paradoxical argument. One of its first actions in Government was to get rid of fundholding, by getting rid of the GP fundholding practises, to dismantle the two-

tier system that has been embedded in the NHS throughout the UK. Yet, today, we are faced with a Labour Government, which is introducing fundholding not for GPs, but for hospitals. There are genuine concerns that what is being proposed in London will develop into a two-tier health service system in Wales. I acknowledge that David Melding has now clarified the Conservatives' position by saying that he would give all hospitals in Wales fundholding status. There are problems with that, which I will discuss later.

The policy being proposed by Labour in London will see the best hospitals receiving additional resources. When there are hospitals performing well and other hospitals not so well, the priority should be to address the needs of those that are not performing well enough. These policies will be introduced via a dubious star system, which they have in England. I am grateful that we do not have it in Wales. Labour in London is proposing a system that might allow hospitals that are performing well to enhance their performance at the expense of hospitals that need the additional resources and assistance.

We will not overcome the problems by making all hospitals foundation hospitals. We must consider carefully what kind of atmosphere that would engender within the national health service in Wales. I believe—and the Royal College of Nursing and Unison have also raised this issue—that it will cause a mad scramble and competition between institutions for resources and staff. That will not engender the spirit of co-operation across the national health service that we are trying to develop and promote in Wales. That individual, fragmented system can lead to some patients and staff winning, but it can also lead, as it has done in Powys over recent years, to some nurses being paid less than nurses in other parts of Wales. We are still trying to tackle that problem. Nurses in Powys receive less pay than nurses in other parts of Wales because they tend to stay in their native communities, and do not have the resources to move around and cherry pick the best paid positions.

Glyn Davies: Do you accept that that issue, important as it is, and I agree with your campaign and the point you have made, is separate from the foundation hospital issue? Foundation hospitals would be spread across the country, and Powys would not be excluded from that.

Kirsty Williams: This is fundamental to the issue of foundation hospitals because you would be allowing individual hospitals to compete for business, trade and the staff that deliver the services to people. Areas such as Powys will become ghettoised as the staff there will be paid less for delivering similar services to other parts of Wales because they cannot move around the country to look for the better paid opportunities,

Alun Cairns: Is this issue not similar to the Assembly Government's policy on recruiting teachers in needy areas and general practitioners in some of the Valleys communities where it is prepared to offer an additional £5,000 in salary? These GPs are being paid £5,000 extra but GPs in Powys are not because they are happy staying where they are.

Kirsty Williams: Given that you represent some extremely deprived areas such as Port Talbot, and the fact that it is difficult to get GPs into the upper Swansea valley, I am surprised that you would knock the plans that are getting vital clinical staff into your constituency. I am amazed. It is obvious that if you vote for the Tories in South Wales Central, you can say goodbye to recruiting doctors in those areas.

The Deputy Presiding Officer: Order. You are running out of time, Kirsty.

David Melding: Do you agree with Evan Harris, the Liberal Democrat health spokesperson in the UK Parliament, who, in debating last week's Queen's Speech, said on the issue of foundation hospitals, that more patients will benefit if every hospital could be run locally?

Kirsty Williams: London is imposing this policy from the top down, rather than allowing it to come from the bottom up. Communities should decide about the delivery of their health services, and it should not be imposed upon by them by Labour London.

Jonathan Morgan: I can understand the reluctance of Labour Members to debate the health service, after all, they have created the worst record on health matters in Wales for a long time. One must only consider the waiting list position for evidence of the series of broken promises over which the Labour Government, happily assisted by the Liberal Democrats, has presided. It is worrying and saddening that until a few moments ago the Minister for Health and Social Services was the only Minister in the front row listening to this debate. Foundation hospitals are innovative and exciting, and the Labour Party in Wales should consider this model. However, it seems to think that throwing money at the service will solve the problems in terms of patient care. It will not, and that does not show commitment. The Labour Party should show that it is committed to solving problems in the health service by using the money to treat more patients. It is not treating any more patients than were being treated five years ago. That is the legacy that the Minister will leave behind when she vacates her office on 1 May 2003.

I will refer to a worrying incident that recently occurred in my constituency. A constituent wrote to me about issues relating to breast cancer. She was recovering from breast cancer and was awaiting her regular check-up at the University of Wales Hospital. While I have the utmost respect for the clinical practitioners at the University Hospital of Wales, who do a fantastic job, the incident that was raised with me a few weeks ago highlighted deep concerns about the health service. She was due for a check-up in August, but received a letter saying that it had been delayed until September. She then received another letter delaying it until November and it has since been delayed until January. For goodness' sake, we are trying to develop a twenty-first century healthcare system. People recovering from serious clinical conditions are not receiving the treatment that they deserve. The reason that was given for those delays was that the hospital could not recruit people to do the job. That, I am afraid, will be the Labour Party's legacy to Wales.

Ieuan Wyn Jones: Although the Welsh Conservative Party has decided to use its debate to highlight the concept of foundation hospitals, I get the impression that it is more interested in embarrassing the Labour Party than in making its case. I have not heard any Conservative Member making a clear, strong case for foundation hospitals. With May looming, they must try to embarrass the Labour Party, but where was the speech in favour of foundation hospitals?

David Melding: Those three hospitals only have a prospect of long-term survival if we give them foundation status, if they were autonomous and if they could succeed as innovators—I know that they could if they were given those powers. A socialist command and control system would close them down, with a pathetic consultation process that would not be allowed to determine anything that goes on in that locality.

Ieuan Wyn Jones: If David believes that every hospital should be a foundation hospital, what is the point of having them? He has made a poor effort to imitate Alan Milburn today. In his speech, Alan Milburn said that the best hospitals would become foundation hospitals. What about the average hospitals? What about those hospitals that will not have the ability to ensure that they have the full range of services available?

For the Labour Party Peter Law tried to give the impression that foundation hospitals will not happen in Wales. Let it say that on the face of the Bill. If the Westminster Bill says that foundation hospitals will only be established in England, I will accept his point. However, the Queen's Speech makes it clear that we will have an England and Wales Bill. The Labour Party in England is driving forward the possibility of Wales having foundation hospitals. We want the Minister's response to the concept of foundation hospitals. Is Labour in favour of them or not? They must answer that question. The Conservatives have let the Labour Party off the hook on the real issue today, which is the Labour Party's failure to deliver a proper health service for the people of Wales. One of the most important statements made in this Chamber was that by the Finance Minister in her budget statement, when she said that she was calling Derek Wanless in to review the health service. Why do that? Is it because we have an excellent health service in Wales? Is it because all the money has been well spent in Wales? Is it because we have great delivery of healthcare in Wales? It was precisely because we do not.

The fact that she has called in Derek Wanless underlines the failure of the Labour Government in Wales to deliver proper healthcare. What is she doing with Mr Wanless? She has asked him to review how money is spent on the delivery of services in Wales. She is also withholding money from the budget, for two years, until that review is published. She does not trust the Government to deliver proper healthcare with the current system, and has called in an outsider to run the system on its behalf. Those are the depths to which the Labour Government has sunk in terms of the crisis in the health service in Wales.

Today, the Conservatives should have nailed the Government on that issue, rather than going after the red herring of foundation hospitals, which they know will never be established in Wales. I ask the Minister, in her contribution to this debate—

Peter Law: You have just said that foundation hospitals will never be established in Wales. That answers your question about the overall England and Wales legislation that gives us the secondary powers to establish them.

Ieuan Wyn Jones: The point is that the next Government to be established here will ensure that there will be no foundation hospitals in Wales. I ask the Minister, in her

contribution to this debate, to tell us—with no more fudging, no more sitting on the sidelines—does she support foundation hospitals or not.

The Minister for Health and Social Services (Jane Hutt): This debate is a distraction from the real issues with which the Assembly should be concerned. We should be debating our reforms of the NHS in Wales, laid out in our plans and in our legislation. We are here to discuss policies being pursued in Wales. That is why the Welsh Assembly Government's amendment 2 makes it clear that the foundation hospital initiative is a policy being pursued in England, and not in Wales.

It is astonishing, David, that you do not acknowledge that the key element of the Queen's Speech for us in Wales was the Health (Wales) Bill. We got that piece of legislation into the Queen's Speech to deal with the reforms that we are taking forward. Ieuan, this is the health Bill that you should be concerned with because this is the Bill that we will take forward, reforming and retaining our community health councils. As you know, that is a popular Welsh development, based on Welsh opinion and Welsh policies.

David Davies: I do not doubt that the Minister would rather discuss play policy, or another similar issue. However, this is the Conservative Party's nominated debate and we wanted to discuss foundation hospitals.

Jane Hutt: If you need to hear it said again, I can assure you that foundation hospitals are not part of our reforms here in Wales, and I will tell you why. This debate gives me the opportunity to tell David, Glyn and Dai again about the key principles that underpin our approach to health service reform in Wales, and which concern the national health service that we want to build. It is a health service based on co-operation—not competition—between hospitals. Our clinical networks in cardiac and cancer services are proving themselves by supporting teams of health professionals that work in hospitals and in the community, to deliver accessible, high quality services in partnership.

Alun Cairns: You say that you want to build a national health service. Are you suggesting that Alan Milburn, the Secretary of State for Health, and the Prime Minister want to do otherwise?

Jane Hutt: We are here to discuss the reforms for Wales, which are based on principles of co-operation and collaboration. I remind Members of our report, 'Access and Excellence', which was published in July 2000.

Cynog Dafis: The question remains unanswered. Why does the Bill not differentiate between England and Wales? I point out to the Minister that Labour has been known to change its mind on issues. It used to believe in public ownership and now it is prejudiced against public ownership. How can we be confident that a future Labour administration will not think differently from Jane Hutt? It may decide that it wants to introduce foundation hospitals, and the legislation would allow it to do so.

Jane Hutt: I am amazed at the number of times the basic business of devolution must be restated. I am surprised at such remarks from Plaid Cymru. We have devolution in Wales precisely to allow policy solutions to be crafted here that will meet our needs. That is why we should be discussing the NHS (Wales) Bill, Cynog, and not a Bill that does not apply to Wales. I have expressed my opinion clearly.

Peter Rogers: Will you give way?

Jane Hutt: I want to get my points across first. 'Access and Excellence' was published in July 2000. We had a good debate on it in Plenary. It was about support for district general hospitals in Wales and I am pleased to restate, in amendment 1, our commitment to our network of district general hospitals in Wales. That report came from a committee chaired by Dr Hall, the Chief Medical Officer for Wales. In the foreword she wrote that:

that is, access and excellence—

'the maintenance of high levels of local access to services at the same time as ensuring excellence in the quality of the clinical services provided.'

That is what we should be discussing today. That is the way forward to protect and support our network of hospitals and community services in Wales. Dai, you helpfully drew attention to the Tory days that gave us the bleak days of the internal market, when hospitals were encouraged to compete with one another and to put other hospitals out of business. Peter also drew attention to that.

On the Welsh Assembly Government's record, we have doubled the amount of funding and investment for the health service. That is guaranteed for the next three years. Our reforms include an additional 8,000 staff—who have been in the system since 1997—new buildings, more equipment, improving standards and fostering innovation in all parts of Wales. David, it is interesting that you began to unravel your manifesto. I am delighted that you recognise that our local health boards are the way forward. I am astonished that Plaid Cymru should reject decentralisation.

Lorraine Barrett: I would like to share with you, Minister, a comment that was made to a friend of mine by an off-duty paramedic in Cardiff whom she met while travelling from London today. When he realised that she was visiting the Assembly, he said words to the effect that 'Jane Hutt is a brilliant Minister'. [ASSEMBLY MEMBERS: 'Oh.'] As a paramedic working in the health service—*[Interruption.]*

That provides local flexibility. There has been much talk of centralisation, but power has been placed in the hands of those local health boards. There is local flexibility within a framework of national standards. Members recognise the importance of national standards such as our national service frameworks for coronary heart disease and mental health, backed up by unprecedented additional investment. That additional investment, and the national standards and local flexibility is what Derek Wanless wants to see. That is why we have invited him to come to Wales to help us. I shall announce the terms of reference for his health and social care review tomorrow at the Health and Social Services Committee meeting, in which I am sure we will have a good discussion on capacity and how to take this forward.

Peter Rogers: You talk about a health service for all of Wales. When will you recognise the needs of north Wales and the problems there? I met you in September and gave you the names and addresses of people who have waited for over 18 months. When I wrote to you again, you said that nobody is waiting longer than 18 months in north Wales. Jane, you know that the orthopaedic service in my area is a catastrophe. When will you recognise that and start treating all of Wales fairly? Also, when will you address the problems with residential homes in this country?

Jane Hutt: The healthcare delivered in north Wales is among the best in Wales. I am proud

I must correct Alun Cairns because all medical students who decide to go into general practice, wherever that may be in Wales, will be eligible for our £5,000 golden hello. That is important. All medical students will be eligible for that.

go far enough for the Conservative Party. You are right to say that we could have a different system in Wales, but we must justify a different system. That is the point. Have we had that justification this afternoon? No. Have we given the patients of Wales any hope that our system, as reformed under Jane Hutt, will deliver more effective hospital care? No, we do not have confidence in that. Ieuan claimed that, basically, all we need is more socialism. I am glad that he said that. The people of Wales must choose next May. They can have fairly old-fashioned socialism from the Labour Party, now supported, rather oddly, by the Liberal Democrat Party, or they can return to a most incredibly socialist system—one perhaps not seen in this country since the 1940s and 1950s. It is a system that does not exist in the rest of Europe. Sweden and Denmark are hardly the most socialist countries in Europe, but they have reformed hospital care, and we should emulate their sort of system.

The Minister said that we should discuss the NHS (Wales) Bill. We would have liked to have a long discussion on that, if it could deliver the reforms needed in the health service in Wales. However, the Bill has been stripped of its original function and purpose, which was a great defeat for Labour. We would gladly have spent time discussing it, had it deserved such attention. It contains some good measures, which we have taken seriously. Indeed, the Conservatives will try to amend the Bill so that we have a provision for foundation hospitals.
