NATIONAL PARK AUTHORITIES - PERFORMANCE MONITORING

1999 - 2000, FIRST HALF 2000 - 01

- 1. Wales' three National Park Authorities each prepare a portfolio of plans setting out their policies and how they will achieve them. Section 66 of the 1995 Environment Act requires NPAs to prepare and publish National Park Management Plans as statements of their policy for managing and carrying out their functions in relation to the Parks. All NPAs already have National Park Plans for their areas which perform a similar role and which are required to be reviewed every five years. A Corporate Work Plan details the annual work programme, with targets, to fulfil the strategy; the annual Best Value Performance Plan reviews achievements and sets out measures to improve performance.
- 2. Additionally, the Park Authorities submit annual National Park Grant bidding documents to the National Assembly summarising the performance in the past year and putting forward the justification for additional funding. Each Park prepares also an Annual Report detailing, in an easily read format, activities and achievements in the previous year. Copies have been made available to Committee Members.
- 3. Reporting on and monitoring of performance is fundamental to all these documents, but the Corporate Work Plan and the Best Value Performance Plan particularly identify and measure detailed targets and performance indicators for each area of work.
- 4. The detailed set of Corporate Work Plan targets are used to measure service performance and achievements, and to help embed the philosophy of "quality assurance" in the Park workforce. These are periodically reviewed by each Park Authority and involve Members in the monitoring and standard setting process. Examples of performance against some key work targets for both 1999-2000 and the first half of 2000-01 are shown under each Park in Appendix I. These targets are

categorised under the Parks' work areas but could equally be listed as contributing to the National Assembly's Betterwales.com objectives of :

- 1. A better quality of life
- 2. A better stronger economy
- 3. Better opportunities for learning
- 4. Better health and wellbeing.
- 5. The National Parks in both Wales and England have now agreed a corporate set of Performance Indicators for inclusion in Best Value Performance Plans. These are shown in Appendix II and are additional to the Corporate Health Indicators and the Planning Indicators prescribed by the National

Assembly, and those prescribed by the Audit Commission. In addition the Parks are encouraged to add their individual local indicators. These indicators will be in place for the next financial year (2001-02) and a number of the National Park Indicators will be regularly reported to enable the National Assembly to assess the performance of the Parks.

- 6. The National Park Authorities recognise that whilst it is essential to monitor their own performance, a wider measure of the condition and contribution of the National Parks is desirable. Accordingly we will be looking to develop longer term indicators which will monitor, in conjunction with others, the State of the Parks. What is needed is a robust assessment of the Parks as areas of special interest to the public in Wales, throughout the UK, and on an international level.
- 7. Turning to the detail of this first report to the National Assembly on National Park performance monitoring the two parts of Appendix I demonstrates service performance against Park priorities and responsibilities.

Appendix II sets out the National Performance Indicators agreed by all National Parks in England and Wales.

8. As a context for these reviews it should be noted that performance in 1999/2000 is despite a zero settlement - in effect a 4% cash cut - for that year, the second zero settlement in three years. In relation to the performance for the first half of the current financial year, the impact of Best Value - and especially the service reviews - is seen in some service areas. An 8.3% increase was awarded by the National Assembly for Wales in 2000-01 and 11.01% for 2001-02.
