**Title :** ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT MINISTER'S REPORT

## **1.1 GOVERNMENT BUSINESS**

### Assembly Investment Grant (AIG)

On 19 June I visited Vixen CNC Ltd of Llanberis, a small company specialising in the manufacture of precision machined components. It was the first company in Wales to be awarded an Assembly Investment Grant. During this visit I also announced AIG support of almost £300,000 to nine businesses located in North Wales, promising the creation of 50 new jobs and the safeguarding of 81 jobs. The companies were:

## **1.2 RECENT ENGAGEMENTS**

On 13 June I launched Port Tawe Innovation Park in Swansea. The following day I represented the Welsh Assembly Government at the British Irish Council meeting in Jersey for discussions on developing the Knowledge Economy. On Monday 17 June I visited the Baglan Energy Park and toured the new power station which is under construction.

The following day I met the Chair, the Chief Executive and members of the British Hospitality Association, before travelling to North Wales for a programme of visits on the next day. This included a meeting on developing the local economy with Huw Griffiths, the Head of Economic Development on Ynys Mon council together with the local MP Albert Owen.

I opened the Business Connections 2002 event at the Anglesey showground and visited Dinorwic Power Station, before launching the Duffryn Ogwen Broadband Wireless Project in Bethesda and visiting Vixen in Llanberis. Later that week I launched the Framework for

Supported Employment in Wales, and presented the e-commerce awards at Wales Regional Gala Lunch Awards Ceremony in the National Botanic Gardens.

Earlier this week I met with Chris Boulton of the Youth Hostels Association. Before arriving here today at the National Botanic Gardens I met with the South West Wales Economic Forum, and attended an Assembly Government seminar on tackling economic inactivity.

### **1.3 OTHER NEWS**

I was delighted to hear last week that Robert Wynn & Sons Ltd of Newport have been awarded an £8.5m Freight Facilities grant by the Department for Transport to develop an innovative transportation system making best use of short-sea routes and inland waterways.

I also welcome news from Gyrus Medical Ltd in St Mellons who last week unveiled news that its new Diego System (for the removal of diseased tissues in the nasal cavity and sinuses) has been launched. A significant clinical advance in sinus surgery, I hope that this system will open up lucrative markets in the US for this unique plant in Wales.

I was also pleased to see media reports on Monday that work is now to commence on the redevelopment of the former Brymbo steelworks site. Brymbo Development Limited (BDL) plan to build houses, recreation areas and business premises on the 240 acre site, creating between 750 and 1,000 jobs. Wrexham County Borough Council, BDL and the WDA formed a unique partnership to bring forward this work, which was part of a Welsh Assembly Government initiative to see the whole area of west Wrexham improved.

## **2. MAJOR ISSUES UPDATE**

### Steel tariffs/EU counter-measures

Pressure continues on the US, but it is not known if the EU will apply tariffs. The EU is not likely to do anything until the US announces the complete list of exemptions (expected in July). It is hoped that the threat of retaliatory measures may increase the chances of a negotiated settlement.

## **3. JOB NEWS**

### **3.1 Job Gains (50 and over) since the previous EDC**

- Norwich Union, Cardiff – to expand existing Cardiff offices, creating an additional 425 jobs
- Argos, Wales – as part of UK expansion plans, this catalogue retailer is opening over 100 new stores in the UK over the next 3 years, creating 6,000 new jobs. At least 200 of

these new jobs will be in Wales.

- Matalan, Rhyl. – to create up to 100 jobs at a new stores in Rhyl. The store is due to open next month and will bring a mixture of full and part-time jobs.
- Everest, Treherbert - this double glazing firm will safeguard 80 manufacturing jobs at its manufacturing facility on the Treherbert Industrial Estate, with support from the Assembly's Regional Selective Assistance scheme.

### **3.2 Job losses (50 and over) since the previous EDC**

- Federal Mogul, Cardiff - up to 100 jobs could be lost at this automotive component firm in Llanishen in Cardiff. A 30 day consultation period with the Unions has commenced. If talks are unsuccessful, the operation could close later this year. The decision follows difficult trading at the site in recent months, and a sharp reduction in the competitiveness of its products.

## **Action Outstanding Annex A**

### **12 June Item 3.2**

I have sent the following letter to David Davies:

#### **LEVELS OF TAXES**

I am sorry that you did not personally receive a substantive answer to your written question. The main thrust of my reply was in fact included in my written report to EDC on 22 May. The answer that I approved is as set out below but an oversight meant that this did not follow on from the holding reply.

**WAQ17750: What information does the Minister have which would allow him to compare the level of taxes paid by businesses in Wales in comparison with the other EU nations, the USA, Hong Kong, Singapore, Taiwan and South Korea, and if he will make this available.**

In comparing the level of taxes paid by small businesses in Wales, I rely on the Chancellor of the Exchequer's recent budget speech stating that the UK now has the most favourable corporation tax for small businesses in any of the advanced industrial countries. This results from the starting rate of tax cut from 10p to zero and the small companies rate down from 23p in 1997 to 19p now. With regard to the main corporation tax rates there is data from the Inland Revenue that allows comparison with the G7 countries and EU countries that are not in the

G7.

### **Notes to table**

- 1) State taxes vary considerably. The figure shown is an approximate average effective rate.
- 2) Includes federal abatement for provincial tax at 10% and a surtax of 4%.
- 3) 25% plus 5.5% solidarity surcharge.
- 4) The figure quoted includes the local business tax, which varies by municipality. The effective rates range from approximately 10%-15%.
- 5) Rates vary. The figure shown is an approximate average effective rate.
- 6) The main rate is 39% with an "austerity surcharge" of 3% levied on all companies.
