Curriculum and Assessment (Wales) Bill:

History of Wales correspondence

Prior to, and during, the Children, Young People and Education (CYPE) Committee's scrutiny of the Curriculum and Assessment (Wales) Bill, the Committee received a volume of correspondence relating to the **teaching of Welsh history** as part of the new curriculum.

This body of correspondence broadly called for the following to be delivered in preparation for the new curriculum:

- 1. Clear guidance to the Innovation Schools,¹ and other relevant groups, to ensure that the history of Wales is central and core to any schemes developed by them;
- 2. Plans to assess the need for relevant resources and to commission a process of providing those resources as a matter of priority; and
- 3. An open and transparent method of developing the areas for study, so that the Senedd, stakeholders and other interested parties have a chance to express their opinions.²

These representations all **fed into the CYPE Committee's consideration** of the Bill. **Written** and **video evidence** relating to this issue was also received by the CYPE Committee.

This issue was also considered by the Culture, Welsh Language and Communications Committee which undertook a separate inquiry into how Welsh history, culture and heritage is taught in schools. It published its report, <u>Teaching</u> of Welsh history, in November 2019.
