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
Introduction

Looking at equal access



We are looking at if disabled and **neurodivergent** children and young people have equal **access** to education and nursery.



If someone is **neurodivergent** it means their brain learns and uses information differently. This can include autism, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), dyslexia and dyspraxia.



Access means being able to take part, find and use something easily.



We will look at nursery and school for children and young people aged 0 to 16.

 What things stop schools and nurseries from providing inclusive and accessible education?

 How well do schools or nurseries talk with disabled and neurodivergent children and young people and their families? Do they include them in decisions and choices?



 Do disabled and neurodivergent children and young people and their families feel they have the same choices as others?

We will hold sessions to ask people questions.




We will make visits across Wales to meet people and hear about their experiences.
