As you may be aware, the Petitions Committee of the National Assembly for Wales exists to consider all admissible petitions received from the public and stakeholders.

The Petitions Committee has received the following petition:

We call on the National Assembly to urge the Welsh Government to recommend that the armed forces should not go into schools to recruit.

Britain is the only country in the European Union that allows a military presence in its schools. Britain is the only country of the 27 European Union countries to recruit 16-year-old children to the armed forces. The armed forces target their recruitment in schools in the most deprived areas of Wales.

We are interested in receiving views from individuals, groups and organisations on the subject of this petition. These views will be used as evidence by the Petitions Committee in its consideration of the petition.

The Committee is interested to hear views on whether schools, pupils, parents or others have any views about the Armed Forces providing careers advice or training in schools or whether this is a service that is valued.

The Committee would also like to hear views on whether there are differences in the ways that the Armed Forces work in local authority maintained schools and independent schools.

## Questions you may wish to consider in responding

- Do you have any concerns about the Armed Forces giving career advice in schools or do you welcome such advice?
- What are the benefits and disadvantages of the Armed Forces giving career advice in schools?
- What impact, if any, would restricting armed forces access to schools have on young people's access to information about Armed Forces careers?
- Do you have any evidence that the Armed Forces target their activities in schools in more deprived areas?
- Do the Armed Forces work differently in independent schools than in local authority schools?
