Thank you for your email.

I did not refer specifically to inspections in 2023 but did reference inspections since the track became licensed by GBGB in approximately November 2023. I am able to provide some further detail in relation to that as follows:

1. Initial Visit – 24 June 2024 - Officers were invited to attend a proactive visit to the track on 24 June 2024.

During this visit, Officers were shown both the track racing kennels and the trainers' residential kennels.

Concerns regarding cleanliness were raised at that time with the GBGB Licensing Inspector, a representative of the track owner, and the track vet, specifically relating to one of the trainers' kennels. An Officer also discussed these issues directly with Mr. Tams, who assured that the matter would be addressed.

To summarise, one trainer's standards were seriously lacking, but it is understood that individual has since left the track.

2. Complaints and Follow-Up (June–September 2025)

Between June and September this year, the Council received several complaints regarding the standard of care at the track and concerns for the dogs welfare. I have attached a redacted version of our report, which outlines our findings in detail and the actions taken in response.

These complaints were handled in line with our usual process—through site visits and the provision of advice.

During a visit on 8th September 2025, Officers discussed the cleanliness issues and potential improvements with both the [REDACTED]. This was subsequently confirmed in writing in the attached report, which was emailed to [REDACTED] on Friday, 10 October 2025, with a request for him to circulate it to all residential trainers.

While potential Section 9 offences under the Animal Welfare Act 2006 were noted (e.g. failure to provide a suitable environment due to dirty kennel conditions), no formal enforcement action was taken, primarily because cleaning was actively taking place during the visit.

We plan to carry out a follow-up visit to assess whether any changes have been implemented and whether standards have improved.

I hope that covers everything and provides the clarity you need.

**Report of
Animal Welfare Visit at
Valley Greyhound Stadium, Ystrad Mynach, CF82 7SP
On Monday 8th September 2025**

1. Background

- 1.1 Greyhound racing in Wales is unregulated, in contrast to England where independent tracks are subject to the Welfare of Racing Greyhounds Regulations 2010 and tracks registered with the Greyhound Board of Great Britain (GBGB) are subject to UKAS accredited self-regulation.
- 1.2 Greyhounds raced at Valley Greyhound Stadium, Ystrad Mynach, the only Greyhound racing track in Wales, were previously owned by private individuals who raced the dogs as a hobby with little commercial reward. The track, known then, as a “flapping” track, was unregulated and GBGB Licensed commercial trainers were not allowed to enter dogs on such tracks.
- 1.3 In November 2023, The Valley Greyhound Stadium became a GBGB licensed greyhound racing track. The premises / operation including the on-site trainers’ kennels are required to comply with GBGB requirements. Further details on these can be found via the following link.

- 1.4 Caerphilly County Borough Council Animal Health Officers, employed within Trading Standards are authorised under the Animal Welfare Act 2006. Their enforcement remit includes animal welfare on farms, licensed premises and at other commercial activity premises.
- 1.5 Inspections of the track have historically never been part of the council’s animal health inspection programme. However, taking into account the commercial nature of the ‘GBGB licenced’ track, any animal welfare complaints received by

the Local Authority will now fall into the Local Authorities remit and be investigated.

2. Introduction

- 2.1 A series of complaints were received by CCBC Trading Standards between June and September 2025 concerning the welfare of the dogs kept in the trainers kennels. As a result of these concerns, Animal Health Officers conducted three visits to the stadium.
- 2.2 The first visit was attempted on 19 June 2025, access was granted for a short period of time until contact was made with [REDACTED] at which point officers were asked to leave the premises. The second visit was attempted on 8 August 2025, where contact was made with the track owner and officers were refused entry. The third visit was attempted on 8 September 2025, where contact was made with the [REDACTED] and access was granted.

3. Trainer's Kennels

- 3.1 The Trainer's kennels are situated at the rear of the carpark, opposite the track. The kennels consist of 4 kennel blocks.
- 3.2 Two connecting blocks (an old block and a new block) are run by GBGB licenced trainer [REDACTED] and consists of 51 kennel units. This trainer had 100 dogs on site during the visit.

One block is run as a rehoming block by [REDACTED] ([REDACTED]) [REDACTED] and contains 12 kennel units. This block houses retired greyhounds that are advertised via [REDACTED] website secondlap.co.uk. This block contained 19 dogs during the visit.

The final block is run by GBGB licensed trainer [REDACTED] and consists of 21 kennel units. This trainer had 42 dogs on site during the visit.

3.3 Each trainer has a number of small exercise paddocks for use. 5 brand new paddocks are allocated to [REDACTED] and 4 older paddocks are allocated to [REDACTED]

4. Kennel Construction

4.1 The kennel units are of a concrete construction; they consist of a concrete floor, breeze block walls and a metal front. They contain one raised bed, running along the back of the kennel, made from concrete breeze blocks. The units are built to the Welfare of Racing Greyhounds Regulations 2010 and GBGB licence condition specifications.

4.2 There are concrete corridors running alongside the kennel units that contain covered drainage channels.

4.3 Each kennel unit houses two dogs, generally a male and female greyhound of varying sizes. They are numbered and contain the names and/or ID of the dogs housed in the unit.

5. Inspection

5.1 Animal Health Officers, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] carried out a walkthrough of each block. Appended to this report are the Animal Health Officer reports for the trainers kennels run by [REDACTED] (Appendix 1), for the rehoming kennels run by [REDACTED] (Appendix 2), and for the trainers kennels run by [REDACTED] (Appendix 3). The reports detail each kennel unit; the dogs and the conditions found in the unit on the day.

5.2 [REDACTED] - Old Block – these kennels were dirty with faeces and urine and a varying degree of dirty bedding. We were informed that bedding is not cleaned out daily and is instead spot cleaned until a full clean out is needed. The visit commenced at approximately 10:30am, staff member ([REDACTED]) had begun cleaning the old block during the visit but informed us [REDACTED] had been

delayed so had only just started. Whilst cleaning out, [REDACTED] was seen replacing the bedding.

- 5.3 [REDACTED] - New Block – these kennels were dirty but the faeces had been scrapped out using a shovel and a top up of fresh bedding had been placed in the bedded area for most dogs. Staff member ([REDACTED]) was cleaning the block during the visit, before moving on to rehoming block. They were unable to wash out these kennels due to water issues and informed us that once the old block had been completed, the new block would be washed down.

It is worth noting that although these kennels had a very strong smell of urine and faeces and were found in dirty condition, we were informed that they had been cleaned out the previous day. There was some discrepancy around timing, however, there did not appear to be more than a days' worth of faeces in the kennels (between 2-4 separate faecal deposits per unit).

- 5.4 [REDACTED] – Rehoming Block – most of these kennels had been cleaned out or were being cleaned out during the visit. Some kennels had fresh bedding topped up. We were informed the bedding is not changed daily, it is spot checked and cleaned out when required. Staff member ([REDACTED]) was cleaning the block during the visit.

- 5.5 [REDACTED] – all the kennels had been cleaned out, and the dogs were being turned out in the paddocks, 4 kennels at a time. These kennels had fresh, clean bedding in the bedding area, and a sawdust type substrate placed on the floor. We were informed that the substrate was used to absorb any remaining water used to wash out the kennel floors and for absorbing urine if toileted on by the dogs.

6. Areas of concern

- 6.1 Maintenance of kennel blocks – externally the kennel blocks appear reasonably well maintained. However, with particular reference to [REDACTED]'s block,

internally there are some areas of the corridors, walls and ceiling that are in a state of disrepair. Areas of exposed brickwork along of the corridors and pitting of the concrete floors allowing the pooling of dirty water/urine were noted. This deterioration is likely down to cleaning/pressure washing and lack of regular maintenance i.e. repair, repainting/resealing and needs addressing immediately. The walls were also splattered with faecal matter/dirty water and required cleaning and repainting.

- 6.2 Maintenance of the kennel units – The kennel units are constructed of concrete breeze blocks with a concrete floor and were previously painted/sealed. The units show sign of wear, paint has worn off and areas of the breeze blocks have eroded away at the junction with the floors, areas of the flooring has also become pitted. The walls were also splattered with faecal matter/dirty water. This deterioration, likely down to cleaning/pressure washing and lack of regular maintenance, is allowing the pooling of dirty water/urine in the kennels and absorption into the exposed porous breeze blocks/concrete. This is also contributing to the strong smell of faeces and urine emanating from the kennels and making the units difficult to clean effectively. Repair, repainting/resealing needs addressing immediately.

During the visit, we were informed by [REDACTED] that [REDACTED] is looking at a Welsh Government grant to cover cladding of the kennels due to issues with construction and maintenance of the kennel units when cleaning.

[REDACTED] whilst [REDACTED] kennel units have the same issues as [REDACTED] in relation to the brickwork, better cleaning/drying of kennels has left them in better condition. Maintenance and repainting/resealing is still required.

- 6.3 Bedding issues – all the kennels are using shredded wax paper type bedding. We were informed by [REDACTED] that it is commonly used within the greyhound racing industry and made from items such as bread wrappings so will sometimes have the printing on the paper. This paper bedding is coated in wax, thin and does not appear very absorbent. A dry, soft, comfortable area is required so other types of substrate should be considered.

6.4 Cleaning provisions – During the visit, we were informed that there is a serious water issue on site which is currently being looked into. There is a lack of water and water pressure to enable adequate cleaning of the kennels simultaneously. We were informed that if one staff member is using the water to clean out a kennel block, other staff members are unable to use the water to clean out other blocks as the water volume/pressure drops causing the water to trickle out which is insufficient for cleaning. This is a serious concern as lack of water provision means cleaning is inadequate, time consuming and risks cleaning not being carried out on a regular basis.

6.5 Drainage – drainage channels run outside the kennel units. During the visit, channels in [REDACTED] kennel blocks were full of faeces/urine and bits of bedding, this had been washed out from the kennels into the corridor and into the drainage channels. We were informed that the drainage channels were cleaned out weekly and also informed that work had been carried out on the main drainage recently due to blockages. Accumulation of faeces/urine and bedding in the drainage channels is contributing to the strong smell of excrement throughout the kennel block and should be cleaned down daily. Ideally, faecal matter and bedding should not be entering the drains in the first place to prevent further drainage problems/blockages which has been previously addressed by the track manager/owner.

6.6 Cleaning methods - We discussed the various cleaning methods used by the trainers.

[REDACTED] - When cleaning out the old block it was noted that faeces and urine were being washed/brushed out of the unit into the corridor, faeces was not scraped up and disposed of before washing down the unit which was causing faeces to be spread from kennels to the corridors and creating a very dirty environment. Attempts were made to brush out excess water left in the kennels, however the kennel floor still appeared wet after this, likely due to poor maintenance of the flooring. In the new unit, faeces had been scrapped out with a shovel but not washed down, this was due to the lack of water available to

clean multiple blocks at once. We were informed that once the old block had been completed, the new block would be washed down.

We were also informed that their method was to firstly wash out all the kennels with water, once all the kennels were done, they would then wash down the corridors with disinfectant and then revisit each kennel to wash down with disinfectant. This method seemed inefficient, time consuming and likely not to be done on a regular basis, especially taking into account the time to clean out the kennels and lack of water availability.

Additionally, in [REDACTED] kennels and the rehoming kennels, dogs were being left in their kennel units whilst cleaning was carried out. This is of concern and should not be done, dogs should be removed from their kennels during cleaning. The dogs only had their beds to stand in during this time and were then left in wet kennels.

[REDACTED] – As the kennels had been cleaned prior to our visit, we discussed the cleaning procedure with a staff member. We were informed that the dogs were taken out of the kennels, 4 kennels at a time, these units are then cleaned out; faeces removed, kennels brushed out due to the substrate on the floor, washed down with disinfectant and dried. An absorbent substrate was placed on the floor to speed up drying and create dry areas, and doors were kept open to speed up drying and improve ventilation. Bedding is topped up or replaced if needed, and for the bed wetter's (dog that urinate on their bedding) their beds are replaced more often. Full bed replacement is done every 2 weeks with daily spot checks and a deep clean is done every Monday.

Poor layout of these kennels does cause issues with ventilation and impede drying of kennels; however, they had solutions in place to address this. Whiteboards were evident on site detailing daily regime, racing regime and vet checks.

6.7 Disinfectant – Both trainers were using livestock disinfectant: Battles 'Black Fluid' Disinfectant.' This disinfectant details usage in kennels and animal houses,

however it also requires it to be left for a short while, rinsed well, allowed to dry and not to return animals until the units have been well ventilated. Additional guidance on the product states to apply away from animals. [REDACTED] informed us that [REDACTED] had been advised by a track vet to acquire DEFRA approved disinfectant, however as the vet did not say which one to get [REDACTED] has continued to use Battles, [REDACTED] also stated that [REDACTED] was using the disinfectant at very weak concentration. With the volume of dogs kept within the kennel blocks, it is impossible to use this disinfectant as directed. Additionally, they should be using it at the recommended dosage but more importantly following their vets advice to get a DEFRA approved disinfectant. The GBGB Code of Practice for the operation and management of residential greyhound kennels provides recommendations on appropriate disinfectant.

- 6.8 Due to lack of maintenance and effective cleaning practices in [REDACTED] kennels, the kennels had a very strong smell of urine and faeces, delayed cleaning during the visit would also have contributed to the smell.

[REDACTED] kennels (rehoming) had been cleaned and were significantly better. However, as with [REDACTED] kennels, the kennels were left wet with dogs still present in the units.

[REDACTED] cleaning practices appeared to be more effective, kennel floors were not wet due to the substrate on the ground and there was an obvious improvement in the smell of the kennel block; the faeces and urine smell was significantly reduced. Although the kennel units and corridors showed similar signs of wear with eroded brickwork and pitted concrete flooring, they appeared better maintained and were also significantly better with no faeces/urine, bedding or debris in the drainage channels.

- 6.9 Kitchen Facilities – [REDACTED] has one kitchen facility available to accommodate both [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] kennels. This facility was in a dirty condition with stagnant, filthy water and dirty dog food bowls in the sink. We were informed by [REDACTED] that the dogs were fed once a day at 4pm, one bowl per dog and that their food is weighed to ensure they are given the correct

amount. Food is a working dog mix which is soaked to soften. We were also shown high energy nutrition supplement in a bottle that is provided to the dogs. Their 4pm meal was already made up in bowls and left uncovered in the kitchen. This kitchen requires a thorough deep clean and should be kept in a clean condition at all times to reduce the risk of pests.

██████████ has one kitchen facility that was significantly cleaner. We were informed that the dogs were fed once a day, in the evening, which was increased to twice a day through the winter months. Dental bones were also given to the dogs to assist teeth cleaning.

6.10 Staffing issues - staff: dog ratio & numbers of dogs - ██████████ has 100 dogs on site and ██████████ has 19 dogs in the rehoming block. They claim 2 members of staff are on sick so were left short-handed. Only 2 members of staff were seen cleaning the kennels blocks (63 kennels, 119 dogs). This is insufficient for the volume of dogs on site and there are serious concerns around the number of dogs permitted especially with lack of staff to provide adequate care for the dogs and to enable dogs to be turned out in the paddocks throughout the day. These issues are contributing to the poor animal husbandry observed.

██████████ has 42 dogs on site and cares for the dogs along with one member of staff. The difference in the standard of husbandry was evident, likely down to a good cleaning regime, exercise regime, and reduced number of dogs. Additionally, we were informed that dogs are put out in the paddocks after food to toilet, which improves the conditions in the kennel units, and reduces the amount of cleaning required the following morning.

6.11 Skin issues – several dogs were seen to have fur loss and fur thinning to hind legs, rump areas and pressure points and some small cuts/sores to their legs, primarily in ██████████ kennels. When discussed ██████████ indicated that the vet had advised its common for the breed to have these issues. These issues need addressing and I would suggest that the husbandry of the dogs needs to be considered.

6.12 Muzzling of dogs and no access to water – several dogs in [REDACTED] kennels were muzzled due to compatibility issues and none of the kennels had access to water. There is concern around the length of time dogs are muzzled when housed together and this need to be addressed. None of the dogs in [REDACTED] or [REDACTED] kennels were muzzled, we were informed that they ensured the dogs were compatible to avoid having to muzzle.

[REDACTED] informed us that they were provided water on a regular basis and normally have water available in kennels but due to cleaning it had not been put back. Dogs also have access to water buckets when out in paddocks.

6.13 Kennel Size and Exercise – The Welfare of Racing Greyhounds Regulations 2010 which apply to England prescribe kennel size requirements and can be accessed via the following link: [The Welfare of Racing Greyhounds Regulations 2010](#). The GBGB specification meet the kennel sizes contained within these regulations.

The Voluntary Code of Practice for the Welfare of Racing Greyhounds in Wales states:

'where kennels are provided, they must be: - sufficiently large to allow dogs to move and lie down without touching the sides or roof, and to be able to avoid any urine or faeces; - secure so that no substances can be given to the dogs; - naturally lit and well-ventilated'

The kennels appear too small for the number of dogs housed in each unit with insufficient space for each dog to move around, lie down and stretch out fully without touching the sides, or another dog, and to be able to avoid any urine or faeces, especially with only one bedded area. If one dog occupied the bedded area and would not allow the other dog access, the only option is to lie on the floor which is used for toileting. The dogs are also unable to get away from each other in such a confined space.

Exercise - [REDACTED] dogs were seen being turned out into paddocks, and we were also informed that they are let out for second time after food to toilet before being bedded down. Concerns were raised over lack of shelter/shade in paddocks but we were informed that GBGB rules do not require it for older paddocks, however it is now required for new paddocks. Discussed Animal Welfare Act requirement for suitable environment which would include shelter/shade when outside. Also discussed possible ways of providing in [REDACTED] existing paddocks.

[REDACTED] paddocks were situated some distance from the kennel blocks on the ground of the racing track. These paddocks were brand new and did not appear to have been used up to this visit. Additionally, during the visit (~3hrs), none of his dogs were taken out and given time in the paddocks. Coupled with the dogs being left in the kennels when cleaning out, this is of concern.

No enrichment was noted in the kennels. We were informed by [REDACTED] that only company and music was provided.

6.14 Demeanour of dogs – Majority of dogs appeared happy, inquisitive, and approached us with no concerns. 1 dog was noted that appeared fearful/nervous and did not want to interact - [REDACTED], and 1 dog [REDACTED] showed signs of distress – circling/pacing in cage continuously. Concern centres around these dogs remaining in the kennel environment and removal/rehoming if suitable should be considered.

7. Conclusions

7.1 There are serious concerns about the maintenance and cleanliness of the kennel blocks and the husbandry of the dogs, primarily those run and kept in the care of trainer [REDACTED]. These are detailed above and need to be rectified immediately.

7.2 The kennel blocks run by [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were significantly better with regards to their cleanliness. However, the units still require

maintenance such as painting/resealing and repair to any damaged brickwork.

- 7.3 No major welfare issues were noted in relation to the bodily condition of the dogs, none of the dogs appeared thin, and all seemed to be in reasonable to good bodily condition with good muscle coverage. Ample food was available.
- 7.4 There were welfare concerns in relation to the dogs with fur loss/fur thinning to the hind quarters of the dogs primarily in [REDACTED] kennels. [REDACTED] response to questions raised about their skin issues was that the vet stated 'it's a common thing with greyhounds' is of concern, and I would suggest it is exacerbated by the standard of husbandry especially when cleaning kennels out. This needs to be addressed and monitored.
- 7.5 There are concerns about the kennel sizes and whether they are adequate/suitable to meet the needs of the dogs when housed for considerable lengths of time.
- 7.6 There are major concerns regarding the staff: dog ratio, especially in relation to [REDACTED] kennels. The dogs need for a suitable environment which is clean and dry, and their need to be exercised appropriately and not left in kennels for excessive amounts of time appear to not be being met. During the three hours we were on site, none of the dogs were taken out into the paddocks, unlike at [REDACTED] kennels, where dogs were rotated in and out of the paddocks during the same period. Additionally, the dogs were kept in the kennels when cleaning was carried out which is not acceptable. The number of dogs allocated to [REDACTED] needs to be seriously reconsidered, especially if there is no improvement in staffing levels and husbandry.
- 7.7 The Track Manager has been made aware of the concerns expressed in this report along with the trainers where conversations were had regarding the construction, maintenance, and cleaning issues with the kennels. The track manager was advised it would be followed up in writing
