6. Dr. Sangeet Bhullar - Key Findings of Generation 2000 report: Internet and digital media habits and digital literacy of over 2000 Year 9 pupils across Wales.

Some of the key findings include:

- Technology provision in schools is lagging behind and needs to improve. Only 44% of children think their schools have good technology for lessons.
- Welsh speaking children say they want more online resources in Welsh.
- There is a disconnect between pupils' digital habits at home and in school.
- Schools need to rethink how they engage with pupils in digital literacy and online safety.
- Parents also need to become more digitally savvy, so they can support their children to use the Internet effectively and safely.
- Children are creative and confident in dealing with the inevitable negative aspects of the Internet, developing a range of active coping strategies.
- Smart phone and tablet use is linked to higher skills and take up of activities.

7. Discussion and close by Jocelyn Davies AM (Chair).

"Young people often understand more about staying safe on the internet than their parents. But that doesn't mean that young people don't need support to understand the messages they encounter online and the dangers of sharing too much. It highlights how important it is that our children and young people are given age-appropriate, comprehensive education about healthy relationships and respect. So I urge the Welsh Government to make a whole-school approach to healthy relationships education mandatory."
