Cadet Expansion Programme - Colonel Nick Beard, Chief Executive, and Stephen John, Schools Cadet Expansion Officer, both of the Reserve Forces' and Cadets' Association for Wales (RFCAW) (See PowerPoint presentation for more information)

- Following Phase 2 of Libor funding Wales is now part of the scheme
- The aim is to involve 10 schools in Wales over the next 2 years
- Cadets feed into the Donaldson review

- RFCAW recognise that the program is not right for every school
- Links with the BTEC National Diploma
- Support from the Ministry of Defence (MOD) and RFCAW
- Hugely important for all levels of the school to be supportive Head teacher/ Governors / Teachers
- Looking at establishing CCFs in deprived areas suggestions that it improves attendance
- BME targeting by the MOD
- Keen for schools to express their interest
- Final selection of schools is done by the MOD
- Currently 6 CCFs in Wales
 - o 3 Private and 3 State schools
- Tri-service
- Working with a staff instructor with Armed Forces experience

Darren Millar: Targeting areas

- Areas of deprivation
- Contacting schools, AMs and MPs along with Armed Forces Champions

Lee Waters AM: Why are you targeting areas of deprivation?

- To provide opportunities
- Help with skills
- Help employment opportunities

Col Lance Patterson linked this to concerns that have been raised in the past in regards to the Armed Forces 'recruiting' in schools. The narrative needs to be clear that this is about skills and not recruitment.

Darren Millar: Is there a limited amount of schools who can be part of the scheme?

 Yes, there is a limited number of places this time round but unsuccessful schools can be entered into the second trench.

Discussion on linking CCFs with Welsh regiments.

Nathan Gill AM: 5 years of CCF but how much funding?

- Libor finding now
- There is work to get MOD funding for the future
- Starting at age 13 and working with the CCF for the next 5 years

Col Lance Patterson: What about 6th Form College's?

 Pupils who have been involved in a CCF during their schooling can often get day release from their 6th Forms to continue.

Darren Millar: Can AM's help?

• Yes, they can talk to their local schools.

Change Step's work with veterans - Geraint Jones of CAIS

• Introduction on Geraint's background

- Psychiatric Nurse with experience of working with veterans
- Short history of Change Step
 - o Picked up slack from an organisation which didn't deliver
 - Focus on north Wales
 - Getting feedback from veterans
 - CAIS has worked with people reliant on alcohol and drugs Change Step built on this knowledge
 - Libor Funding success for 2 years
 - Working in partnership is key
 - Veterans UK
 - Veterans' NHS Wales
- Veterans didn't have just one issue eg. Homelessness- they had multiple issues that needed addressing.
- 1037 people have been in touch with Change Step
- Most are self-referral
- Speaking to other veterans about their problems is key to the way Change Step works and its success
- Mental health is the biggest issue.
- Veterans want to be outside and doing things
- 8000 views on Facebook
- Change Step's success has been recognised by a good number of wider reviews
- Libor funding will continue for another 2/3 years

Darren Millar: Praised the continuing success of Change Step

Change Step receives no funding from Welsh Government but Change Step touches mostly devolved areas.

ACTION: Letter to the Welsh Government asking them to match finding quoting the Forces and Mind and Chester evidence.

- Air Force Visit Spring 2017 at RAF Valley
- Navy Visit looking at inviting AMs to visit when there is a vessel docked in Cardiff Bay

Armed Forces Pathway Scheme launch

- 29th September
- 3 tier launch
- The idea is get people involved with the Armed Forces
- Age 14 to 17 Course about the Armed Forces
- Age 18 to 24 training and placement
- Up skill scheme for those in service, veterans and reservists
- Currently the project is mostly supported by EU funding
