Children (Abolition Of Defence Of Reasonable Punishment) (Wales) Bill

You will be aware that the Welsh Government has recently introduced a Bill to abolish the defence of reasonable punishment in Wales.

The National Assembly for Wales's cross-party <u>Children, Young People and Education</u> <u>Committee</u> is undertaking an inquiry into the general principles of the <u>Children (Abolition</u> <u>of Defence of Reasonable Punishment) (Wales) Bill</u> ('the Bill'). More information about the Bill and the Committee's work on it is attached as an Annex to this letter.

Given the New Zealand Parliament's passing of the <u>Crimes (Substituted Section 59)</u> <u>Amendment Act 2007</u>, the country's experience is cited in a number of places in the Welsh Bill's accompanying <u>Explanatory Memorandum</u>. The Committee also notes that Family First New Zealand responded to the <u>Welsh Government's consultation</u> on this proposed legislation in 2018. As such, the Committee is keen to hear from you.

The Committee would be grateful to know **your views on this legislative proposal**, **particularly in the context of the Explanatory Memorandum referring to New Zealand's experience**. Members would also welcome any other comments you may wish to share via the Committee's <u>online consultation</u>. The closing date for comments is **Tuesday 14 May 2019**.

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<u>ANNEX</u>

The Children (Abolition of Defence of Reasonable Punishment) (Wales) Bill

The purpose of the Bill is to abolish the common law defence of reasonable punishment so it is no longer available in Wales to parents or those acting in loco parentis as a defence to assault or battery against a child.

The defence currently applies in respect of both the criminal and civil law. Under the criminal law, it applies in respect of the common law offences of assault and battery; and under civil law, in respect of the tort of trespass against the person.

The Bill is intended to support children's rights by prohibiting the use of physical punishment, through removal of this defence.

The intended effect of the Bill, together with an awareness-raising campaign and support for parents, is to bring about a further reduction in the use and tolerance of the physical punishment of children in Wales.

The Committee's work

The <u>Children</u>, <u>Young People and Education Committee</u> is a cross-party committee of the National Assembly for Wales comprised of 8 Assembly Members. It is responsible for scrutinising the Welsh Government's policy, legislation and finances as they relate to children, young people and education in Wales.

From March to July 2019, the Committee will be scrutinising the general principles of the <u>Children (Abolition of Defence of Reasonable Punishment) (Wales) Bill.</u> You can read more about <u>how legislation is scrutinised</u> on the Assembly's website. To help inform the report the Committee will produce, Members would like to hear the views of organisations and individuals about the Bill, particularly on the following **terms of reference**:

- the general principles of the Children (Abolition of Defence of Reasonable Punishment) (Wales) Bill and whether there is a need for legislation to deliver the Bill's stated policy objectives;
- any potential barriers to the implementation of the provisions and whether the Bill takes account of them;
- whether there are any unintended consequences arising from the Bill;



- the financial implications of the Bill (as set out in Part 2 of the Explanatory Memorandum);
- the appropriateness of the power in the Bill for Welsh Ministers to make subordinate legislation (as set out in Part 1: Chapter 5 of the Explanatory Memorandum).
